

## Clergy Corner



### How is it that we hear?" Acts 2:8a

This was part of our text for Pentecost Sunday (May 20<sup>th</sup>). Since there is simply not enough time to talk about everything in any one sermon, I thought I'd touch on this phrase in my article this month. Here is the whole verse in NRSV: "And how is that we hear, each of us, in our own native language?"

Let's get some context. Jesus' disciples had been holed up in Jerusalem for quite a number of days. Part of the reason is that they were afraid of what might happen to them if they were wandering out and about in the community because

the uproar around Jesus was not quite over yet. But probably the biggest part of the reason they were there was that Jesus told them to wait in Jerusalem. They were waiting for Jesus' promise of the Holy Spirit.

Well, Jesus' promise was kept. The Holy Spirit came – with a loud swoosh and a fiery presence! The apostles were filled and began to speak as they were given ability. I find it interesting that even though they were in a house, a crowd could hear what had happened and what they were saying.

People heard and were drawn to this strange phenomenon to figure out what was happening. It is in this confusion and excitement that we learn that "devout Jews" from other countries, but now living in Jerusalem said, "How is it that we hear?"

There are a few things about this that I'd like to point out. First off, these people were hearing something that made sense to them. It was in their own language that they heard. It was in terms they could understand. Often I think we feel that what we know and believe about God will not be "understood" by others. They may not understand in the same way we do, but God's good news message is not limited to our way of thinking and speaking.

Next, those "strangers" were surprised because no one would expect a bunch of backwater Galileans to be able to identify with people from the far reaches of the world, from different and varied backgrounds. This was a wonder indeed but I think it is also an important lesson and encouragement for us. Just because we are not "worldly" people does not mean that God won't or can't use us to share about what God is up to. The God who has impacted us can and does have an impact on other people – even if they are part of another generation or another culture or another rung of economic ladder. "God's deeds of power" (Acts 2:11b) can be communicated to everyone.

We may have to work very hard at developing our skills of communication. We may have to work diligently at learning about other cultures or generations and what is important to them and how they think. We do this so that we can be effective in sharing about God. But we also can be encouraged that God's message is something that can enhance and change their lives as it has ours. We may also be surprised, from time to time, at how quickly God can prepare us for the tasks we are called to do in Jesus' name.

Dear Beloved of God

Soon we will gather in Convention in Camrose – University of Alberta Augustana Campus – June 14-16, 2018 under the theme based on I Cor. 13:13, **“Faith, Hope, Love: and the greatest of these is love.”** I am appreciative of the work of Wendy Christensen-Grosfield who has again been contracted to serve as Convention Manager.

This month I share more Convention highlights, in addition to those mentioned in my May 2018 Message.

Worship is a significant focus of Convention as we will begin and close each day with worship. A Worship Committee, chaired by Carolyn Ethier and including Chaplain Jeff Decelle, Colleen McGinnis, Rev. Kathy Calkins, Robyn Simpson-Mohr, and Dr. Joy Berg has planned a series of unique services to bless and enrich our worship time together.

The celebratory Opening Eucharist with organ and brass begins in the Chapel at 2:00 pm on Thursday, June 14. We gather again in the chapel for Thursday evening's Jazz Vespers, a time of prayer as well as remembrance of those who have died. Each day we share in Morning Eucharist with a time of Dwelling in the Word in the convention hall. Our brief Sending Worship, with installation of Synod Council, Synod Secretary and Lutheran Theological Seminary rostered representative and Blessing of the Bishop, is scheduled for 3:00 pm on Saturday, June 16. Offerings will be shared equally between the Lutheran World Federation Endowment Fund and the ABT Synod Bishop's Discretionary Fund.

There will be a Convention choir singing at the Opening Eucharist service that you are welcome to join. The practice for the Convention choir will be held in the Convention Hall at 12:30 pm on Thursday, June 14. Dr. Joy Berg will lead the choir.

We will gather Friday evening for a celebratory banquet honouring those with ordination anniversaries, as well as the first recipient of The Synod of Alberta and the Territories *Stephen D. Wildfang Leadership Award*.

Video presentations highlighting our four mission priorities through story will be shared throughout the Convention and each delegate/congregation will receive a DVD of the same and discussion guide for use in their own context.

New this year: Registrants to the Convention are invited to register for Friday and Saturday “Lunch and Learn” events. Up to 25 registrants will meet in identified rooms for lunch and further conversation with: National Bishop Susan Johnson on ELCIC Global Mission, President Bill Harrison from Lutheran Theological Seminary, The Rev. Dr. Brian Rude, our guests from Colombia, CLWR and Jeff Pym with ELFEC (Evangelical Lutheran Foundation of Eastern Canada). All other registrants will have their lunch in the cafeteria.

Also new for this Convention is an invitation for submissions of artwork to be displayed in the convention hall, reflecting the theme of the convention. Thanks to each contributor. I am looking forward to walking through the art gallery.

Throughout the Convention as you worship, listen, pray, discern and share stories registrants are invited to write their thoughts to the following two statements on sticky notes and to post them to the large print paper in

the convention hall: "I am hearing God say to us...", and, "I sense that one of the places the Spirit is inviting our Synod to join with God in God's work is..." These will be gathered and reviewed for action at the September 2018 retreat of Synod Council.

As we gather from across our Synod it is my prayer that together we will be open to the Spirit's work among us...shaping...transforming...reworking...guiding...and that we will know the reality of the words of Paul to the church in Rome (15:13): "The God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

# Gluten-free Communion Bread

The Worship Committee has baked gluten-free communion bread. The recipe came to them from The Church of the Cross in Calgary. The intention is that this bread will be offered on the third Sunday of each month as well as on festival Sundays. At the same time, regular wafers will be available. The ingredients for the bread are as follows:

2 cups gluten free all-purpose flour  
1 t baking powder  
1 t baking soda  
½ t salt  
¾ c sugar  
1/3 c canola oil  
¾ c coconut milk  
1 1/4 c unsweetened applesauce

## May Council Highlights

- Jonathan Hawkins opened with devotions, based on the May 15 reading from Oswald Chambers' devotional collection *My Utmost for His Highest*. In a season filled with things like Annual Meetings and University Convocations (and other significant, but often stressful events), Chambers' encouragement to readers, as children of God, to allow God to work in/through us to 'rise to the occasion', no matter what the situation or trial, seemed timely.
- Council considered its standing item of increasing spiritual growth and expanding relationships within the congregation in context of potential priorities for the upcoming year. Discussion included creating more opportunities for prayer, expanding small group studies, developing relationships with other congregations, and reviewing the Call to Spiritual Renewal resource at 'www.elcic.ca/csr'. Other topics included congregational visitation (by pastors and parishioners), loneliness, Stephen ministry, teaching, and continuing to support the various committees in their work.
- Committees have been requested to review their Terms of Reference and report their suggested changes back to Council. Some committees have begun to work on this, with Worship already recommending some minor changes.
- New basement chairs have been ordered – the company will provide a firm time frame once they finalize fabric requests. Support will coordinate the involvement of extra assistance in unloading when delivery occurs.
- The work of the Nominating Committee is going well. One additional committee member is still required for Worship and Witnessing.
- The World Mission Group has proposed that the interest from the Endowment Fund New Ministries be directed to a new ministry in Columbia, which will be coordinated with the Synod and the Church in Columbia. Council approved the presentation of this request to the Congregation at the Annual General Meeting.
- Church lockup has been managed for some time by various Support Committee members – the Committee is now creating an ad hoc group with 3-year terms to specifically coordinate and oversee this task.
- The new Messiah website is in operation. The web address remains the same – [www.messiahcamrose.ca](http://www.messiahcamrose.ca) to help maintain news and relationships with people once connected to Messiah but no longer in Camrose.
- Support has appointed Lois Larson as the new manager of the web site. Committees and congregational groups are being asked to review their material on the website and give feedback to her, as well as requested updates and changes.
- **Messiah also has a new email address: [office@messiahcamrose.ca](mailto:office@messiahcamrose.ca).**

- A new refugee family is coming soon. Pastor Calvin is helping the refugee group coordinate the preparations for their arrival.
  - The meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer. The Next Regular Council Meeting is Tuesday, June 19, 2018.

### *Thank You*

Thank you to all who contributed money to the **Seeds of Hope** appeal to build irrigation ditches in Ethiopia. **\$1985.00** was sent through the congregation and several more donations were given directly to CLWR.

### *Refugee Support in Uganda*

The Government of Canada has provided CLWR with \$3.9 million for a two-year project which began April 1, 2018. CLWR will be contributing \$100,000 to bring the total funding project to \$4 million. The project will address emergencies, protection, health, sanitation and employment opportunities for 40,000 South Sudanese refugees living in Uganda and also to help people in communities who are hosting them.



### *Canadian Foodgrains Bank*



Many Canadian farmers representing 30 denominations help people who don't have enough to eat through a Canadian Foodgrains Bank growing project that raises money for CLWR. Through the project, local farmers grow, tend and market a crop to raise funds to help end hunger around the world.
