


In 2014, ELCIC members gave over \$63.1 million in regular offerings to support the call to be *In Mission* for Others through these three expressions of the ELCIC:


NATIONAL CHURCH

I send you greetings in the Name of the One who is the light of the world, Jesus our Lord, as you gather for your Annual General Congregational Meeting.

Spirit -Led Leadership This past year through each month's Message for Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders, a reflection and study on select readings of Paul's letter, to all the saints in Christ Jesus who are in Philippi (1:1b), I began with these familiar words: I thank my God every time I remember you... (Philippians 1:3).

When you gather together, know that I am filled with gratitude to God for you; that I am thankful for our partnership in the gospel; and, that you continue to be in my prayers as I know I remain in yours.

Hope-Filled Discipleship

When you meet together, you will be making decisions about your priorities for ministry. You will be adopting budgets that enable ministry that joins in God's mission in the world. You will be supporting your partners in ministry – the rostered leaders of this Synod, and especially those who serve among you as they, first and foremost, seek to equip you for the work of ministry: the building up of the Body of Christ.

Innovative Tradition

Joining God's mission means that your ministry is among the people with whom you live and move and have your being. Your ministry is done each day in relationships with your neighbours through your words and deeds and the living out of your baptismal identity as God's beloved children.

Collaborative Partnerships

Ministry continues beyond the neighborhood and congregation through the many faces of the Church and many facets of its ministries: our Synod and its staff, our National Church expression, the Lutheran World Federation, *En Misión con El Salvador: In Mission with El Salvador*, and our Companion Synod – The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia.

Perhaps at this year's Annual General Meeting you might reflect, name and give thanks for the gifts and mission into which God has invited you and your congregation. Consider taking a few moments in small groups to listen to each other and then share with all gathered reflections on the following:

- 1) Share about a time or situation when you or your congregation experienced God's love.
- 2) What resources do you have within your community? Share three gifts God has given you.

As you meet, you might also prayerfully consider forwarding a tithe (1/10th) of your annual income as a congregation as your minimal offering for Benevolence for the ministry of the Synod and through the Synod to the wider Church. Some congregations have exceeded this mark already, but I would encourage all congregations to set this goal.

As you gather be sure to join others across the Synod as you:

- + prepare nominations for youth, lay and rostered delegates to the 2017 ELCIC National Convention (http://albertasynod.ca/wp-content/uploads/2015/12/ABT-Nomination-and-Election-of-Delegates.National-Convention1.pdf).
- + explore our Synod's Abiding in Right Relations (AiRR) Ministry Team through the information available on the Synod webpage (http://albertasynod.ca/ministries/right-relations/).
- + subscribe to our Synod's new weekly e-mail newsletter, Wednesday's Word, which begins January 6 and replaces the Synod mailings. Subscribing is easy on our Synod's homepage (<u>www.albertasynod.ca</u>).
- + discuss our upcoming "Participating in Hope 2.0" gatherings in 15 locations throughout our Synod. When and where have you been invited to gather with other congregational leadership in February? Uncertain? Check with the Synod office or go to the Synod's webpage to find the schedule (http://albertasynod.ca/missional-formation/participating-in-hope/).
- + consider the CARE (Congregational Action and Response for Mental Health) Ministry Team's invitation for up to 3, \$100 scholarships *per congregation* in our Synod, so that each of our congregations can send an individual or team (lay or rostered) to train with Mental Health First Aid Canada (http://albertasynod.ca/ministries/c-a-r-e/upcoming-events/).
- + determine delegate(s) to the June 16-18 Synod Convention.

And remember Paul's words to the saints in Philippi: ...sisters and brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things (Philippians 4:8).

My prayer is that your gathering will be a recital of gratitude and praise to God for the signs of the Holy Spirit at work in, through, around, and among you.

- 1. Welcome and Call to Order: Chair Odell Olson opened the meeting at 12:17 pm.
- **2. Opening Devotions:** Diaconal Minister Bev Swanson led in devotions as printed on the back cover of the Annual Report.

4. Review of Congregational Meeting Minutes

4.1 Annual Congregational Meeting of June 8, 2014

CM 15:06:02 MSC (Ray Blacklock/Frank Hoehn) To adopt the minutes of the Annual Congregational Meeting of June 8, 2014.

4.2 Special Congregational Meeting of February 8, 2015 (Formation of Call Committee)

CM 15:06:03 MSC (Vi Madison/Jonathan Hawkins) To adopt the minutes of the Special Congregational Meeting of February 8, 2015.

5. Consideration of Reports

5.1 Report of the Diaconal Minister

Bev Swanson thanked the staff. She requested prayers for staffing and noted some significant upcoming staffing concerns. Marlys Sorenson has resigned as KidFest Coordinator after 16 years. Our Youth Coordinators, Ben and Stacey Lyster, have also resigned due to an educational opportunity. In addition, as of May 9, 2015, Thai Phong Trieu is no longer the custodian at Messiah Lutheran Church. New casual staff members Ruth Jensen and Lori Mokry cover for Administrative Assistant Doreen Brewer when she needs to be away from the office much to the appreciation of Doreen.

5.2. Officers' Reports

5.3 Reports of the Committees

Learning Committee: Darlene Dahle thanked Marlys Sorenson for her 16 faithful years of service as KidFest Coordinator. Darlene also encouraged all members to consider teaching at KidFest and/or assisting Nora Gilbertson with the Friendship Club.

Service Committee: Ray Blacklock made special mention of the Ministry to Seniors which was omitted from his written report.

Support Committee: Ron Foshaug stated there was an oversight regarding the Synod allocation (as stated on page 8 of the minutes of the June 8, 2014 Annual Meeting Minutes) and asked for guidance from Council as to how this should be handled. Ron also announced that Lloyd and Carolyn Olson have been handling the custodial duties in Thai's absence and that, as of June 1, 2015, they were hired on a one-year interim basis and will be paid an hourly wage. However, from June 27 – August 18, 2015 the Support Committee is seeking volunteers to cover some custodial duties while the Olsons are away. Ron also mentioned that all of the security cameras are now in place.

Witnessing Committee: Gail Stolee reported that more volunteers for Coffee Fellowship are needed and there is a need for cookies for Founder's Days and Big Valley Jamboree Parade day. Erhard Pinno spoke on behalf of the World Mission Group and the Refugee Support Group.

15:06:04 MSC (Erhard Pinno/Ray Blacklock) That Messiah endorse the idea of the ELCIC sponsoring 500 refugees to help honour the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation and that Messiah give full consideration to being one of the congregations sponsoring one of these refugee families.

Worship Committee: David Dahle referred to his submitted written report in response to a question regarding how we report numbers to the Synod after the discontinuation of using pew communion cards. Since communion cards don't seem to be an accurate way of determining numbers, this item may be further discussed at the Committee, Council and even the Synod level. David reported that the first Hymn Sing evening, coordinated by Donny Loewen, was well attended and the Worship Committee plans to support the continuation of Hymn Sing evenings.

All committee representatives thanked their committee members, the staff and the congregation.

Carolyn Andersen presented the Nominating Committee's report and thanked the members of her committee: Don Myrehaug, Joanne Myrehaug and Eleanor Kopperud. Carolyn also thanked those contacted for considering a position. She noted that all positions except for one on the Support Committee have candidates. Carolyn asked for any further nominations and receiving none, the following motions were presented:

CM 15:06:06 MSC (Dave Larson/Frank Hoehn) That nominations cease. CM 15:06:07 MSC (Erhard Pinno/Dave Stolee) That the Nominating

Committee's list of names be declared as elected.

President Odell thanked Carolyn and the Nominating Committee for their diligent work.

Installation of those elected will be on Sunday June 14, 2015, at the 10:00 am Worship Service. The **Annual Planning Meeting:** Phase 1- immediately after the Annual Congregational Meeting. Phase 2 - September 10, 2015, 7:00 pm. This meeting involves all members of Church Council and all Standing Committees: Learning, Service, Support, Witnessing and Worship.

6.2 Call Committee Report and Extending Diaconal Minister's Contract Call Committee representative Art Pfeiffer reported that the committee has met 4 or 5 times; one of these meetings with Bishop Larry Kochendorfer in attendance. The committee compiled a congregational profile and submitted it to the Bishop. The

committee's next meeting is scheduled for June 24, 2015 when Bishop Larry will be bringing names of potential candidates.

Chairperson Odell Olson reported that an evaluation meeting is to be scheduled with Diaconal Minister Bev to extend her contract which was up at the end of April 2015. Bishop Larry supports this extension as Bev has a plan to work towards ordination.

1. Call to Order: 11:45 AM by Odell Olson, Council Chair

A count of members present was taken to establish that a quorum was present. Craig Wentland was introduced as the representative of the Bishop and would conduct the meeting.

2. Opening:

- Hymn # 576, verses 1&3
- Scripture Lesson—Matt. 28:18-20
- Prayer
- Charlene Brown, Call Committee Chair-- to provide biographical information about the candidate and read the Letter of Call and the Memorandum of Compensation

3. Candidate—Pastor Calvin Skriver:

- History of post-secondary and previous employment presented on screen
- Cheryl Nester recused herself from the Call Committee to avoid any possible conflict of interest
- Candidate was nominated by a Messiah member as well as was asked by the Bishop if he would consider Messiah since he was filling out a mobility form
- During the Call Committee interview with candidate many of his strengths were evident
- After the Committee decided to name him as a primary candidate, he met with the staff and with Diaconal Minister Bev Swanson which resulted in positive feedback to the Committee.
- The Committee voted unanimously to present the candidate to the congregation for a vote as the Senior Pastor of Messiah

4. Voting:

- Charlene Brown moved that we call Calvin Skriver to be the pastor of Messiah Lutheran Church according to the Letter of Call and the Memorandum of Compensation.
- Vivian Grue seconded the motion. Carried.
- Floor was opened to questions
 - Treasurer Ivar Saugen presented some financial information:
 - Messiah was in debt \$33,500 on loans. A member's loan of \$25,000 was forgiven and so the long term debt is now \$8,000.
 - Auditors' report had a balance of \$60,000 in 2014
 - Savings of \$30,000 on janitor fees and Youth Minister
- Ballots were distributed, marked with circle around either, "YES" or "NO" and then collected to be counted
- Of the 123 ballots handed out, 116 were "YES" with some spoiled
- Prayer for Pastor Calvin as he considers the call from Messiah
- Dave Larson moved and Jonathan Hawkins seconded the motion that the ballots be destroyed. Carried.
- Vicki Olson moved and Audrey Lett seconded the motion that the meeting be adjourned. Carried.

Calvin Skriver - Senior Pastor

See, the former things have come to pass, and new things I now declare; before they spring forth,
I tell you of them.

Isaiah 42:9

Grace and peace to you from God, our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ.

So, here I am – the "new guy" in your midst. It has been wonderful and full of new things. There are so many "new" people and procedures for me to get to know and to become familiar with; it may take years for me to get everything straight. © I am so thankful for the warm welcome that Lori and I have been given to this new place and situation.

Now, because I am so new, there are not many old things to report on. I haven't done much: I've participated in a few worship services; baptized a couple babies; attended a few (well, quite a few) meetings; visited a few people; and read many documents pertaining to Messiah Lutheran Church. I've discovered (not surprisingly) that Messiah is a vibrant and busy place with a huge heart for caring for each other and the community and world around us. Messiah does indeed "share Jesus Christ with all people". It is good to be here.

Even though I haven't a lot to report about what I've done, there are many things that God has done through others in the fellowship of Messiah Lutheran Church. You will see what others have been up to in the rest of this Annual Report. Enjoy reading and feel pride that God has chosen you to be a part of what is happening in this place.

So much has happened over the past three years and this last year was no different. It was an honor to serve in this position in an interim capacity while we as a church found our ground and prepared to bring in a new minister to join and to lead our team.

I wish to take this opportunity to say once again, Thank you... for we have been ministers of the gospel "together", which is such a joy to be a part of. Many of you comment and wonder at how in the world I did this work as one pastor. And to that I wish to say... God's power and strength has indeed been with us. I say "us" because truly I have not been on my own.... WE as a church have lived and moved and ministered together. So my deepest thanks to each one of you.

I have been ever blessed by how we have been empowered by the Holy Spirit as we have cared for our people, worshipped together, camped at Hastings together, met in committees and council meetings together, taught and confirmed our youth, met with our youth and children and their families, married our couples and celebrated the lives of some very old and beloved members and sadly many others far too early in life. These have been just a few of the sacred happenings that have taken place in our midst...all empowered by God's amazing love.

I also wish to note at this time that our staff has been such a wonderful team. Their support and the way they each take on their part in the ministry with such compassion and such willingness to do more than asked without being asked...has been amazing. God has been and continues to be with us on this journey.

It has been a rich time of depending on the Lord as we moved into a call process and opened for who might be the best fit for our parish and ministry to join our team. I especially love it when our youth get involved in our worship together and in leading us in various ways. I also enjoyed working with some of you to make our worship space also meaningful in the raising of banners and in celebrating the church year. It is simply a joy to worship with you and to lead worship.

Confirmation – We confirmed six youth from Messiah this last year. What an amazing group of youth they are! What a wonderful two years we spent together and soulful weekend we had as they shared their expressions of faith with us and led us in worship. Thanks to the prayers of many including their prayer partners. Our kids need prayer so that their faith may continue to grow. Confirmation is a joint effort with Bethel so we also had four Bethel students and Pastor Deborah Ann Taylor and myself taught them together. I very much enjoy this collaborating teaching ministry.

Leadership and Staff –As I have already mentioned our staff are truly amazing in all they bring. I have so enjoyed being their team leader the last three years and another year before that. They are such a great group and so open to serving and using their gifts in whatever ways are needed. I most certainly found that we bonded as a group and enjoyed the flow of daily ministry together.

Hastings Lake Church Retreat – This was a highlight for those who attended as we gathered to share in community together in a multi-generational way. It is a time where we can just be in nature and enjoy the company of one another as we gather to study, play, sing, worship and pray together. Those who attend seem to come away with a renewed sense of God's love and of connection with one another.

In the years past I have helped to lead our single parent camp out at Hastings for four days. Last year I took a break from this but will be there again this summer in August for a few days.

Weddings and Funerals and Baptisms are times where we grieve and celebrate together. They are moments where families gather to give thanks and be together. Beginnings and endings always offer opportunities to experience God as a church in fresh and new ways. I am always blessed and honored to be a part of these moments with you.

Youth- It was sad for our youth to see Ben and Stacey Lyster leave. As they said goodbye, we opened to continuing to gather. Dale and I have worked with the youth over that last year and it has been a rich time. We have recently begun connecting with Bethel to work jointly with our youth. This we hope will continue and grow in a more formal way as we provide opportunities to gather our youth and continue to help them on their faith journey.

Our Council has people with diverse gifts who have all contributed their share to our effective functioning. We have 8 regular Council meetings per year. This year they were held on the third Tuesday of the month at 4 PM. No regular meetings were held in July, August, or December. Attendance of Council Members was excellent, all were dedicated and reliable. We tried Skype for those away from home but had technical challenges. Our Advisor for the majority of the time has been Diaconal Minister Bev Swanson who has attended every meeting in spite of a very busy schedule. Recently we welcomed Pastor Calvin Skriver who has given us a new perspective on issues. Devotional leadership at each meeting was shared among the Council members, Bev Swanson and Calvin Skriver. We spend time building our relationships through sharing after devotions. We always begin and end the meeting with prayer.

Special Council Meetings

We started this year with the Annual Planning Meeting September 11, about 50% of the Council and Committee members attended. The time was used to set Committee and Council Goals for the year.

Messiah Council Accomplishments 2015 2016

Council deals with policy issues each year; it is one of our main duties. We managed human resource issues with Bev Swanson. This year we dealt with a staff member who did not return from vacation, as we could not establish contact, we began and completed termination procedures. We in conjunction with the Support Committee contracted most of the custodial services using volunteers for snow removal and vacation coverage, the Support Committee did an awesome job in this transition. We, with advice from the Support Committee approved increases and changes to remuneration and expense reimbursement to align with Synod guidelines and maintain equitable treatment for all staff. Modifications to the Music Ministry Coordinator Contract to assure adequate insurance for private student instruction in the church building were made. We assisted the Committees in changing policy and implementing changes to the Facility Use Policy, the charges for funerals, wedding deposits and Lector Guidelines. We looked at the way Council disseminates information from its meetings, in particular making sure that changes in procedure and policy are implemented with advice from those affected.

This year there were changes with the KidFEST Program brought about by the resignation of our long time Children's Ministry Coordinator and to the Youth Program brought about by the move of the Youth Ministry Coordinators. We worked with Bev Swanson and the Learning Committee to replace the leadership in these two programs. A group of interested parents with support from Bev Swanson and the Learning Committee now coordinate KidFEST. Bev and Dale Swanson have been leading the youth group. At their request we formally approved joint meetings between the Bethel and Messiah Youth Groups.

We approved the World Mission Group's recommendation that Messiah move ahead with bringing a refugee family to Camrose, coordinating with CLWR and the Camrose Inter-Church Refugee Committee. The Government's promise to bring the Syrian refugees to Canada has overwhelmed the civil service ability to process any but these.

We supported the Call Committee assisting them in developing a financial package with moving expenses for the pastoral call. We adjusted, in consultation with the Bishop, Bev Swanson's contract on the arrival of a second pastor.

Conventions and the delegates to them are an ongoing responsibility. Remarkably few members seem interested in serving as a delegate. This year we arranged for Pastor David Eriksson to speak to the congregation about the National Synod Convention to which he was our delegate. We recruited and approved Darlene Dahle as our delegate to the East and West Conference Convention. We received her report and agreed to keep the Reformation Challenge and nominating delegates to the National Synod Convention as standing agenda items. Ruth Jensen volunteered to be our lay National Synod Convention nominee. We assisted her in completing documentation. We paid the fees set by the Synod of Alberta and the Territories for delegates to the Synod Convention at Augustana in June. I will serve as lay delegate, our present pastor and diaconal minister as well as all our retired pastors and Pastor David Eriksson qualifies as rostered delegates.

The Secretary Carol Green regularly produced Council Packages, Minutes, and Council Highlights for The Messenger and has kept the Governance Manual up to date with policy change. She and Carolyn Andersen, in conjunction with Bev Swanson and the office staff reviewed and revised paper and electronic filing to assure proper privacy, security and backup of human resource files, contracts and archival papers.

The Treasurer Ivar Saugen has worked diligently providing Council with more timely financial information and forecasting. He has assisted the Audit Committee in their function and he has worked on the proper implementation of the old and new endowment funds collecting information from lawyers, accountants and the Canadian Council of Christian Charities.

The Vice President Carolyn Andersen has ably replaced me when I was absent not only conducting meetings but supporting staff administratively. She conducted a survey of the Committees on how we might improve attendance at and the content of the Annual September Planning Meeting. She chairs the very important Nomination Committee obtaining members, working long and hard on obtaining nominees for all the Council and Committee positions. Thank you to Don Myrehaug, Joanne Myrehaug and Eleanor Kopperud for assisting her in this important task.

The Committee Liaison members were diligent in attending the meetings of their committees and maintaining contact with the Committee Chairs. They operated very effectively communicating from and to these committees.

Committees and People serving in other ways

Thanks to all the standing committees and their members who carry out the programs in Messiah. These are 30 people who plan, organize and carry out the programs that make up the mission of Messiah. It includes everything from regular and special service planning, educational classes for all ages and several special groups. They coordinate our internal and external charitable activities. They arrange for the care and repair of the buildings and all they contain. They are all dedicated volunteers sharing their gifts.

Thanks to the Call Committee who worked through an exhaustive process to bring us a second pastoral team member and for their continuing work in the transition. They brought their gifts to the process with enthusiasm.

The Future

We have a second pastor, the culmination of two years of planning. Our Diaconal Minister has served us admirably through long hours and many joyous and sad occasions. They are working together to form a Pastoral Team. We have asked them, on the advice of the Bishop, to provide us with a written list of how responsibilities will be shared. We look forward to changes in old missions and perhaps some new ones.

Conclusion

I am grateful to have worked with such a varied and dedicated group of individuals this last year. I am also grateful that all of the Council Members have agreed to continue next year. It will be exciting to see what God has in store for us in the coming year.

I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ which surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all of the fullness of God. Now to him who, by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, Ephesians 3: 16 - 20

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Learning Committee

Members of the Learning Committee were Alice Lindstrand, Margo McPhail (joined in April), Cheryl Nester (Chairperson), Sharon Ofrim, Marie Olson and Tim Schultz. Our Council Liaison was Sharon Gilbertson. This committee met 12 times throughout the course of the year.

Significant change occurred in Children's Ministry this year due to the retirement of Children's Ministry Coordinator Marlys Sorenson. After meeting with the parents of some of our KidFEST children, a volunteer parent group was formed to organize and plan KidFEST for the year. Parent input was excellent during this process and many great ideas were discussed and put into practise. Two changes in KidFEST format were implemented. Instead of meeting downstairs for an 'opening' prior to worship service, children were invited to either sit with their parents or sit together with KidFEST teachers in the front pew at the start of worship. Following the Children's Story, children and teachers would head downstairs together for a quick 'Opening' together and then to classes. The other change was an expansion to three classes instead of two. This decision was made due to the age ranges and number of children involved in KidFEST this year. The WHIRL curriculum was used again and was generally thought to be engaging for the students and 'teacher friendly' for our volunteer teachers. The Learning Committee would like to extend a huge thank you to all of the volunteer teachers, snack providers, assistants, story tellers and special presenters for their commitment to our Messiah kids. Special mention must be made of 3 ladies who took on the bulk of the organizing and planning this year; thank you Deanna Didriksen, Michelle Kennedy Hawkins and Shannon Stolee.

We would also like to thank Helen Sather who has continued in her role as *Splash* coordinator. Helen does the record keeping and the necessary ordering of the *Splash* newsletter that is sent to parents whose child has been baptized at Messiah. Families receive these monthly letters until their child is four and old enough to enrol in KidFEST.

We were so fortunate to have Bev and Dale Swanson take on Youth Ministry this year. Youth events generally took place twice a month. Anywhere from 5 to 12 young people attended gatherings sometimes at the church, sometimes at a home and sometimes at a particular location in the community. Most events were activity oriented followed by devotion and discussion to foster spiritual growth. Thanks Bev and Dale!

Six young people from Messiah as well as four youth from Bethel Lutheran Church completed their Confirmation studies with guidance and instruction from Diaconal Minister Bev Swanson (and co-teachers Pastor Deborah Anne Taylor and Pastor Bonnie Arends). On April 17th, Maiya Bentley, Andrew Fletcher, Kassia Holm, Jada Schultz, Taylor Schultz and Keysha Swanson were confirmed. Confirmation students attended classes weekly and took part in a retreat at Camp Kuriakos in the fall. These special youth did an amazing job sharing their "Faith Expressions" at their banquet and then sharing their gifts in leading worship on Confirmation Sunday. Congratulations and thanks to these fine youth!

Though Family Ministry this year took place rather informally, young families did meet periodically for social activities. The Learning Committee along with Bev will give this area more attention in the fall. Suggestions for what 'family ministry' should look like are welcomed by the committee.

Diaconal Minister Bev Swanson facilitated a Pre-Marriage Workshop in March which 5 couples attended. Private marriage preparation sessions with Bev also occurred.

Once again we thank Nora Gilbertson for her commitment to the Friendship Club. Thanks also to Jane Arial, Cindy Bentley and Audrey Davis who have assisted her this year.

Thank you to Shellie Carson and Loya Steinwandt who took over the task of maintaining the church library this year.

Thanks to all those who contributed to our AdultFEST sessions. A variety of interesting and inspiring presentations were made by members of our faith community here at Messiah. Other presenters included people from our local community as well as special guests from outside of Camrose. Thank you to the following people who willingly shared their personal "Faith Journey": Donnie Loewen, Ray Blacklock, Marie Olson, Robin Carson, Cece Watts, and Pastor Calvin Skriver. Other presenters included Pastor David Eriksson, Pastor Brian Rude, Bev Swanson, Dale Swanson, Darcy Albers, Lavona Broen, Sharon Gilbertson, Darlene Dahle, Peter LeBlanc, Rev. Ryan Andersen, Bill Harder, Phil Watts, and Pastor Bonnie Arends. Thanks to all.

The Learning Committee offered another adult learning opportunity in the form of a 'Book Club'. This five week study started in February with an introduction to Richard Rohr's book entitled <u>Breathing Underwater</u>, <u>Spirituality and the Twelve Steps</u>. Thanks to Marie Olson for leading the introductory evening and for providing us with background on "The Twelve Steps". Between 20-25 people attended Book Club. Meetings featured a focus on particular chapters followed by questions and discussion. The Learning Committee felt this style of adult study was appreciated by those who participated and will likely offer another Book Club study or something similar next year.

Men's Bible Study continues to meet on Saturday mornings at 8:45 in the Lounge. These fellows take a look at the readings for Sunday and discuss their implications for daily living. Lectio Divina is another group that meets on Monday mornings at 10:30 in the Lounge. Jane Arial leads this meditative session. The Wednesday morning prayer group continues to meet at 8:30 in the Chapel. Contact Berniece Sogge with prayer requests.

Service Committee

Main Purpose: To assist the Congregation in realizing its nature and mission in the area of service as defined in the Constitution: Article 3, Section 5.

1. Activities undertaken by the Committee:

- a. **Volunteers:** Although other committees, groups and individuals recruit and train Messiah members for service in support of Messiah's worship activities, education programs, outreach, and physical building care, the Service Committee seeks to affirm and promote these activities in a more general way. The main affirmation took place on Sunday, April 10, when volunteers were thanked by President Olson with the help of special cake, at the pot-luck lunch.
- b. **Adult Education:** In cooperation with the Learning Committee, Service organized three sessions in February on topics of importance to many Messiah members: February 7: "Hospice in Camrose" presented by Joy LeBlanc; February 21: "Public Transport in Camrose" presented by Tony Hladun; February 28: "Service Options for Seniors" presented by Donna Coombs.
- c. Under the title, "Strengthening our Relationships with our Aboriginal Neighbors," the Committee organized five Tuesday evening sessions (March 29 through April 26 in the Basement Auditorium) during which portions of the DVD series "8th Fire: Aboriginal Peoples, Canada & the Way Forward" were viewed. The objectives were to build knowledge, understanding and empathy in regard to our aboriginal neighbors. The fifth evening included a presentation by residential school survivor, Eva Tourangeau, a Camrose resident. Many thanks to Dale Swanson (twice) and Pastor Calvin Skriver (three times) for facilitating the discussion at the end of each session. Thanks to Lowell Dahlman for technical assistance. Between ten and fifteen people took advantage of these sessions.
- d. Other: The Service Committee:
 - i. assisted at the Family Camp in June
 - ii. prepared and served lunch on September 13
 - iii. facilitated the ELCIC Praise Appeal in April
 - iv. worked with the confirmation class for the delivery of Christmas hampers
 - v. worked with the Office for the collection of food for the Rock Lutheran Inner City Society of Edmonton
- **2. Activities overseen on behalf of the Congregation**: As per its mandate in the Bylaws, the Service Committee affirms and supports specific activities by Messiah members in the community, both locally and internationally:
 - a. **Canadian Lutheran World Relief** (CLWR): Marilyn Hoveland is Messiah's formal connection to CLWR. Marilyn solicits, receives and disseminates promotional materials from CLWR. This promotion is also done in connection with Messiah Lutheran Women (MLW) who are strong CLWR supporters. A CLWR Sunday was held on April 24.

- b. **Neighbor Aid**: Over the past year, Messiah has assisted the Camrose Neighbor Aid Centre through a monthly \$200.00 donation, the Sunday food cart collection and with a member on its Board, Diane Scarisbrick. Diane would like to relay a thank-you message from the Board to Messiah members for the cash donations, food donations and the various volunteers for the support given again this year. "It takes a community working together for the success of the Camrose Neighbor Aid Centre in assisting the less fortunate families in our community."
- c. **Martha's Table**: For two months each year, (May and September, one day per week) about 30 Messiah members take their turns at preparing and serving noon hour lunches at St. Andrew's and the United Churches, respectively. Lavona Broen and Elaine Taylor are the persons who coordinate these acts of service.
- d. Meals on Wheels: During 2015-16, thirteen drivers and/or assistants delivered meals for one week in June, November, February and May. Leona Norenberg as Coordinator scheduled the drivers, and liaised with the Meals on Wheels coordinator at Camrose and District Support Services. Regrettably, Leona is stepping down from her role as Messiah Coordinator. We thank Leona for her competent and friendly service, and also the drivers/assistants for their faithful service toward those needing meals in their homes. "Service" will be recruiting a new coordinator. Any volunteers?
- e. **Ministry with Seniors Group**: Under the leadership of Carole Saugen, and more recently Frieda Ness, this Group gives special attention to the needs of Seniors through spring-season teas, visits on birthdays, and a special communion service in December. On the recommendation of the Seniors Group, Service is reviewing some aspects of the *Policy for the Protection of Children, Youth and other Vulnerable People*.
- f. **Good Samaritan Fund**: "Service" oversees this Fund which is outside the regular congregational budget, and is built up on the basis of needs advertised in the Messenger and Bulletin. Providing for emergency monetary needs as evaluated by the pastoral team, Service is available to assist in this evaluation at the request of the pastors. Service recommends that monthly and annual reports on income and expenditures be made available to the congregation.
- 3. An Area in the Camrose Community which has been identified as a need:
 Accommodation for homeless on winter nights: This area of need, previously identified, continues as a need which the Service Committee wishes to address.
- **4. A challenge for Messiah Congregational members:**By its mandate, the Service Committee provides unique opportunities for Messiah members to serve in ways not available on other Committees.
- 5. Thanks

The Service Committee thanks the individuals who provide leadership for the several areas which fall under its mandate. They are named above. As Chairperson, I extend my sincere thanks for the enthusiasm, talent, and concern which the Service Committee members have brought to our meetings and have used for the benefit of others.

- 6. Completion of link door opening system \$1,000-2,000
- 7. Sanctuary roof (good for 8-10 years) \$30,000-50,000
- 8. Screen projectors \$10,000
- 9. Speakers for sanctuary area \$15,000
- 10. Repaying parking stalls on west side of sanctuary \$20,000-30,000
- 11. Repair or replace pews \$1,500 per pew to repair and pad
- 12. Sanctuary lighting (fixtures and bulbs) \$500-5,000 each
- 13. Electronic sign (outside) \$30,000
- 14. Fellowship Hall boiler \$12,000-20,000
- 15. Sanctuary boilers (two) \$10,000 each
- 16. Youth room elevator \$80,000-250,000

Internet Outreach Proposal from the Support Committee for New Mission Endowment Funds

Imagine an outreach from Messiah to anyone with internet access. Imagine a chance to share the good news with people beyond the range of our Channel 10 viewers. Technology makes it possible for us to interact with people with the gospel around the world. Imagine an online ministry that enables us to reach far beyond Messiah's geographical borders. Imagine sharing not only our Sunday services, but our recorded Bible studies, educational programming – even online prayer forums would be possible. Truly an opportunity to Share Jesus Christ with all people!

The proposal takes advantage of our existing video cameras for our Channel 10 broadcast and would stream via the Internet to anyone with Internet access.

The Support Committee recommends this new outreach ministry – a new mission for Messiah – be considered for the Mission Endowment funds for new missions.

This new outreach ministry will be accessed through a new website that will build a community of interested viewers locally, across the province, across Canada and the world.

Should the technology costs be greater than the funds available from the Mission Endowment Fund, a small direct appeal will be made to the congregation. It is proposed that the technical kinks be ironed out this summer and the outreach goes live with a full launch in the fall.

Witnessing Committee

The Witnessing Committee is made up of the following awesome people: Lavona Broen, Mary Ellen Eriksson, Shirley Loewen, Jim Ofrim (Council Representative), Erhard Pinno, Gail Stolee (Secretary), and Cece Watts (Chair).

A huge thank you to the members of the committee who have each done so much in furthering the Kingdom. This year we have focused not only on being a welcoming church, but also on being an inviting church. We listened to some DVDs of Michael Harvey as he gave sessions on this, and in April we were privileged to attend a session at the Anglican Church where he challenged us personally to be an inviting church.

So we have been given different opportunities to be a presence in our church as well as in the community. Every Sunday the members of the congregation extend hospitality through coffee fellowship following the Worship Service. Special thanks goes to Elaine Schultz who faithfully draws up the schedule for this important ministry. We have been reminded lately that some of our older members have found it necessary to step down, so we encourage others to take their place. It is not a big commitment, but it is important.

Not only do we have coffee fellowship every Sunday, but for 10 months a year we have lunch on the 2nd Sunday. We had a tent set up at the corner of our property and served coffee, juice and cookies for anyone who wished to stop by. Also close to Christmas as part of our coffee fellowship we served oranges and nanaimo bars after the wonderful Christmas pageant put on by the Friendship Club in December.

Sharing Jesus Christ, Cross Culturally, with all People

Annual Report to the Witnessing Committee, May, 2016

"How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" Romans 10:15

Existing for the purpose of keeping before the congregation Jesus' command to go into all the world with the Gospel, the World Mission Group normally met on the first Monday of each month to study, pray, plan action, and have fellowship.

The Biblical basis for our opening study and meditation was drawn from several books of the Bible, and from related publications, usually with a mission outreach theme.

Although our most important activity is regularly praying for missionaries, the Group also directed its energies to other activities:

1. Messiah's most specific connection with a missionary is to Rev. Brian Rude who serves in El Salvador among marginalized people, particularly gang members in prison and "at risk youth" on the streets.

Rev. Rude is a full-time missionary of the Alberta Synod. All support of Rev. Rude is through designated givings from Alberta Synod members, and from people in other Synods. People in other synods may send their support directly to the Alberta Synod. For the period 1 May, 2015 through 30 April, 2016, individuals in Messiah and the MLW contributed just over \$6,000 toward the goal of \$10,000. Special thanks to contributors to "In Mission with El Salvador."

2. In its 21st Anniversary of organizing World Mission Months, the Group chose the theme, "Jesus said, 'Go!' What does that mean today?" for January, 2016. The sessions attracted between 33 and 55 people to the adult classes in the basement auditorium. The featured speakers and their topics were: on January 10, Audrey Lett, Cece Watts, and Ray Blacklock sharing, respectively, in regard to Dr. Ron Lett, George Watts and family, and Ryan Cole, describing the varied ways in which these three are responding to the Great Commission; on January 17, Erhard Pinno chaired a session in which people who had been refugees told their stories of life since first coming to Canada: Alejandra Rios from Colombia, Norman Mah (whose father had come as a refugee from China), Mrs. Irving on behalf of Vietnamese

refugees, and Erhard as an immigrant from Europe, having previously been a displaced person; January 24, Christian Chavarria from El Salvador; January 31, Ron Downie from Calgary speaking on behalf of the persecuted church.

- 3. The congregation has had strong contact with George Watts and family who have gone to Burundi for a two year tent-making ministry of sharing the Gospel. Although George started as a teacher at a University there, political unrest necessitated a move within the country, this time to a rural hospital where he has become administrator.
- 4. For promotional purposes, the bulletin board in the Link regularly features world mission issues. In particular, in November, congregational members posted on a world map the names, locations and ministries of people in cross-cultural ministry for whom they were praying. The *Messenger* contains regular reports of mission activity, especially from or about Rev. Rude.
- 5. We appreciate the support received from the Witnessing Committee as it oversees our activities.

The Chair acknowledges with appreciation the active participation in the World Mission Group of Vincent and Mary Ellen Eriksson, Nora Gilbertson, Erhard Pinno, and Cece Watts.

We give thanks for the faithful involvement over many years of Marie Tveit who has had to withdraw from the Group for medical reasons.

This Group, which is neither appointed nor elected, is open to others who would like to share in its activities.

Refugee Support Group

Messiah's long tradition of sponsoring refugees was enthusiastically affirmed when we agreed to sponsor another family. On November 25, 2015, the Refugee Support Group agreed that we apply for a family from Eritrea and begin to raise \$15,000.00 for their support as soon as we were notified of their coming. We chose Eritrea because the oppressive government in Eritrea was forcing many to flee and secondly, there are Eritreans in Camrose that could assist us in welcoming the family. For whatever reason Canadian immigration did not provide CLWR (Canadian Lutheran World Relief) with any family profiles for our consideration. Mr. Fikre Tsehai, who manages the refugee sponsorship program for CLWR in Vancouver hoped that once the Canadian government met its commitment to resettle 25,000 Syrian refugees, it would focus on processing refugees from other parts of the world. A government memo in March sounded encouraging. But it appears that the Sponsorship Agreement Holders like CLWR, are still waiting on the government to provide them with family profiles for consideration by waiting sponsoring groups like Messiah. Mr. Tsehai knows our history and desire to sponsor a family. He is asking us to wait patiently. I would not be surprised if we have a family in time for our annual meeting. We need to be sure that we have enough oil in our lamps so that we will not be unprepared when the family suddenly arrives!

Camrose Refugee Coordinating Committee: Since Messiah is a member of the CRCC and Messiah members have been participating in the mission of sponsoring refugees at the community level, a brief summary of the work of the CRCC needs to be included in this report. A few years ago the Camrose Inter-Church Refugee Committee was established to sponsor refugees. Last fall at our first community-wide meeting it was agreed that we should include other organizations and individuals in order sponsor more refugees. Our mission remained: "CRCC will encourage and facilitate the sponsorship of refugees". We were all encouraged by the attendance at our monthly meetings (about 40) and the deep commitment and enthusiastic support for sponsoring refugees. The possibility of assisting government-sponsored refugees was received as a timely opportunity consistent with our mission. We sent an offer to sponsor 10 families. Unfortunately, we were left with the impression that our offer to house these families in Stoney Creek was impractical because of the distance (from Edmonton) involved. Perhaps our offer will still be considered. In the meantime we are back where we started – encouraging private sponsorships. Let's hope and pray that the Government of Canada will remain committed to resettle refugees and get on with the processing. We all know that there are many desperate refugees who are waiting, some for 10-20 years in refugee camps. We need to be ready to help. Thank you to: our congregation for the ongoing support of refugees; to members of this Refugee Support Group; the MLW for the many things they do to help refugees in all parts of the world; those who have prayed and shared many kindnesses with Edna as she continues her treatment for leukemia; those who provided funds for Paula to purchase a car; those who shared the refugee updates and stories at the January 17 Adult Forum; and finally thanks to Jesus for giving us a soft heart for refugees.

Upon vote of the congregation, the Call Committee was formed in March of 2015. By the time of last year's annual meeting we had put into place our congregational profile and met with Bishop Larry Kochendorfer regarding the process going forward.

The Call Committee began at that point exploring nominations for Pastors that had come from the congregation and also those that had come from the Synod office for consideration. Overall we considered 3 candidates. Of those three, one we decided not to pursue past initial consideration of their mobility form. For one candidate we conducted an initial skype interview. The Call Committee met a final time in this process to consider all information, feedback and references and voted unanimously to present Pastor Calvin Skriver for the position of Senior Pastor at Messiah Lutheran Church. On December 13, 2015 a congregational meeting was held and the members voted to officially extend the call to Pastor Calvin. In early January that call was accepted and on March 1, 2016 Pastor Calvin Skriver began his role as our new Senior Pastor.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all members of the Call Committee for their dedicated and prayerful work in this process. It was a pleasure to walk alongside you in discerning what God's plan for Messiah Lutheran was. I would also like to thank the congregation and staff for their prayers, support, patience and trust in us during this important time and exciting time!
