#### **Clergy Corner**



"Be doers of the word, and not merely hearers" James 1:22a

Here comes September!

I hope and trust that many of us have had a good summer: gardening, fishing, camping, vacationing, walking, swimming, boating, relaxing and whatever else you love to do while the weather is warmer. These things are important to keep us healthy and balanced in our lives – ready for other activities that often focus on people and needs outside ourselves.

We now move into the harvest season, into a new school year, into shorter and cooling days, basically into "regular routines". The same is true of our congregational life. Our Learning Committee has been gearing up and the same will be true for our other committees and the council. I hope you will have some place and part in the routine of our life together as we move through fall and into winter. If you don't, please call me or Bev or the office and we will try to get you connected in.

Worship is a central piece of what we do together. We gather to hear the word of God from scripture, in prayer, in song and through our sacraments. It is important to do this well. To do worship well, it is important to have as many people as possible preparing, helping, supporting and simply "being there". I am glad so

many of us have been able to do this over the summer months and look forward to all of us making Sunday worship a regular part of our routine.

The apostle James knew the importance of joining together in worship and hearing the word of God. He also knew that our relationship with God is more than just worship. Prayer, reading, listening and singing: these things help to prepare us for the routine of being children of God in the world. James points out that what results from hearing God's word is "doing" God's word.

Again, I am so thankful that we have many ways of "doing" God's word in and through our congregation. There are many of us who "do" God's

word at times even where there is not a direct connection to the working of Messiah Lutheran Church. Wonderful! Keep on with responding to God's presence in your life by "doing the word".

James continues to encourage those hearing his letter to be a little less introspective and to find a little more inspiration in the word of God. Sometimes organizations, in trying to do the very best, get a little bit too focused on making sure things are done "right" (according to rules and guidelines and making sure everyone agrees) but in this regulating, some things don't actually get "done". May we avoid this as much as possible.

God's word inspires and gets our hearts and minds and bodies into "doing mode". Which is a reflection of what God is always up to: feeding, healing, comforting, encouraging, cajoling, and loving. This is what we are intended to be up to.

Sometimes we wonder what it is that we are supposed to "do". James talks about this "doing" as caring for orphans and widows in their distress. I suspect that the intention here is to care for any who are in distress. We at Messiah do this already in many ways. This is good. Are there others that we can help? Are there resources we have been gifted with that can be used to care for people in distress? How about you? Have you resources or abilities or time to do God's word with that are not being used? I welcome your insights, questions or comments!

#### LETTING GO...SO WE CAN OPEN

It is almost the end of August. The summer went by so quickly it seems. Soon the trees will be letting go of their leaves. I can feel it in the air as the temperature chills and sun is not as warm. Indeed it is a time of both letting go of summer and picking up as programs, schools and schedules begin.

There is also a freshness in the fall air...unless...like ourselves...it comes with a flooded basement. Yes...and with that a musty smell...which is gone now, but not without a lot of dehumidifying.

We came home from the mountains to a mess. Things were piled upon themselves and unearthed. Thanks to some wonderful generous people who came, moved boxes out of harm's

way, and began the process of drying it out.

There is something rather frustrating about finding things literally "unearthed". It felt like everything in our world was literally turned up-side-down. It was also hard to find that people now know what lies beneath and in your carpet and under your furniture. It is very embarrassing to have things opened for others to see. I am sure many of you know just what I mean. And yet as we brought things out into the light and let our wounded egos go...we found that facing the reality of our basement unearthed gave us the freedom to do something new. We began to throw stuff out...sort and create new space. It actually feels lighter now.

We could actually see that which was encumbering us...and needed to go. We could appreciate creating new space and we could open to letting go of stuff we had hung on to for who knows what reason...which was strangely not easy to do. It was a bit of a forced cleanse.

As we let go of "stuff" and as we made decisions about what was important to keep for a bit longer, we felt spaciousness and new life enter our being, our basement and our home. What was a struggle became a blessing in many ways. (Although I am not sure my husband Dale is quite there yet...)

Isn't this how it is in our walk with God? There are so many things that we hang on to things that are helpful in our spiritual lives...sin that daily that binds us, habits that die hard, relationships gone wrong, struggles with addictions...the list could go on. They weigh us down. They get old and musty and then they hide underneath our lives affecting how we live in relationship to others and to God.

When we allow the Spirit to shed some light on things and let God unearth that which holds us down...we find we are set free...no long weighed down by sin. New life enters. New spaciousness in our souls arrives and we can create and think in new ways once more.

We are empowered to walk more free to love.

Our home strangely feels so much lighter. There's lots more "stuff" that needs tending to in our basement space but this is a great start.

It is indeed a process...this spiritual unearthing. There will always be moments when the Holy Spirit wants to cull our souls...help us to get rid of the stuff that is encumbering us. For the God who loves us truly wants us to walk free and able to move freely.

In Hebrews 12:1 we hear these words:

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us,"

Like our basement...where our family now has room to move, where our son has room to play and our daughter has places for friends to hang out...it is so much easier to move in our lives. In much the same way we can move toward our goal of following our Lord when we are not laden down with things that hold us back.

As the fall sets in....and the leaves fall from the trees...there is a letting go that takes place...a letting go that allows for new life to enter. Let us also let go of those things that hold us back from being free in Christ so that we can live and move freely sharing the gift of God's love with others.

Thanks be to God...for all that has been provided so that this can be so!

Dear Beloved of God -

Immediately following the June 14-16, 2018 Synod Convention, the Synod of Alberta and the Territories was pleased to host a Global Consultation which included Companion Synod partners: The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO), the South Carolina ELCA Synod, the SE Minnesota ELCA Synod, ELCA Global Mission staff and the Synod of Alberta and the Territories.

Bishop Atahualpa Hernandez from IELCO had requested the Consultation in order to further our conversation and deepen our expression of communion following the November 2016 International Consultation held in Peru.

As we gathered, the consultation participants often referred to the Emmaus story of the disciples walking together and Jesus coming among them. The global mission's accompaniment model is one of walking together in solidarity, side by side, practicing interdependence and mutuality, in service to God's mission. The values of the accompaniment model are interconnected, and include mutuality, inclusivity, sustainability, vulnerability and empowerment. The core purpose of these relationships, this accompaniment, is God's mission.

The devotions one morning focused on Revelation 7:9-12, "After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands" (vs. 9).

"Here," shared the devotion leader, "here in this text from Revelation we see God's dream of one global congregation. Gathered are the Colombians, those from the United States and Alberta. One global congregation speaking a multitude of languages. One global congregation standing before the throne and before the Lamb. Here we see God's vision. Here we see God's dream of one global congregation."

I experienced this one global congregation when together with Tricia (Ariza) Hoeppner from Ascension, Edmonton we facilitated our Synod Delegation's journey to Colombia July 26-August 7. Our journey, primarily to the rural congregations and ministries of IELCO outside of Bogota, was life-transforming as together we learned of the vast and important ministries: seniors, displaced, marginalized, children through visits to three of the four IELCO schools, single mothers, deaf children and youth, after school meals and homework assistance, various congregational ministries...and most importantly, the significance of relationships...meeting with the leadership of the Lutheran World Federation's World Services office, meeting most of the pastors of IELCO, worship, generous hospitality...one global congregation.

Personally, I was refreshed through the journey and the relationship within the delegation, and the conversations with many friends previously met in Colombia...dear dear friends. And refreshed in the values of family and relationships, faith and hospitality.

Global relationships are complex, and they require time and attention to sustain, but how life-giving as together we live into God's one global congregation dream.





#### Messiah's Ministry in El Salvador

Messiah members contribute to the financial support of the ministry of Rev. Brian Rude who serves in El Salvador. An organization to which he belongs there is named *IPAZ*, a coalition of representatives of several Christian denominations. In a recent statement, Rev. Rude gives us some sense of the challenge facing *IPAZ* and indeed its individual members, including Rev. Rude:

"The government has taken a firm stance against anything or anyone hinting of dialogue, including *IPAZ*. The atmosphere of weekly meetings seems to alternate between nervousness about a police raid, leading to arrests and interrogations, or a hopeful sense that the government will change course and realize that it needs *IPAZ* as an ally, to

pursue dialogue and peace and so overcome the rampant social violence. Several "bridges" between gangs and *IPAZ* have been imprisoned or killed over the past couple years. Numerous pastoral members of *IPAZ* have been interrogated at length, and had their churches and offices inspected. This includes the Anglican bishop emeritus, a German Lutheran pastor, an evangelical pastor working with World Vision as well as another evangelical pastor. Still the conviction that God is calling us to promote dialogue in order overcome social violence remains strong."

And so our congregation and individual members in it continue to pray for Rev. Rude that he would continue to be inspired to speak and act on Christ's behalf in El Salvador.

In the three months since the new financial year started on May 1, 2018, Messiah members have contributed \$815 to this ministry in El Salvador. \$10,000 by next April 30 is the goal. Envelopes to facilitate further gifts may be found at the Welcome Centre at the rear of the sanctuary.

#### **AUGUSTA VICTORIA**

Augusta Victoria compound is a church-hospital complex located on the southern side of the Mount of Olives in East Jerusalem. The compound was built by the Empress Augusta Victoria Foundation in 1907-1914. Today, apart from the hospital, the complex also includes the German protestant Church of the Ascension with a 50 metre high bell tower, a meeting center for pilgrims and tourists, an interreligious kindergarten and a café, as well as the Jerusalem branch of the German Protestant Institute of Archeology.

Today, Augusta Victoria Hospital provides specialty care for Palestinians from across the West Bank and the Gaza Strip with services including a cancer center, a dialysis unit and a pediatric center. In 2016, it inaugurated a bone marrow transplantation unit. The biggest project is yet to come, the Elder Care and Palliative Medicine Institute, a 144-bed facility. It is the second largest hospital in East Jerusalem, as well as the sole remaining specialized care located in the West Bank or Gaza Strip. In 2016, the hospital had 118 inpatient beds, 52 ambulatory beds and stations, with 403 staff.

The Lutheran World Federation took over responsibility of the property after WWII, and in 1950 established a large hospital for refugees in the compound. Since then Augusta Victoria Hospital has been primarily run and financed by LWF and a United Nations agency. The hospital mission statement includes the provision of health care without regard to race, creed, gender or national origin. From 2013-2018, the hospital has received \$2,257,801.00 in funding from CLWR.

A plaque in the hospital reads:


