

Minister's Message

GIVING THANKS!

As Thanksgiving rolls around I am reminded to give thanks. I don't always find that comes easily or even naturally. So often in our lives, we can get focussed on that which is not going right...or on those things that are struggles. And yet we do have so very much to give God thanks for.

I am also aware that giving thanks comes easier on some days than on others and in some seasons in our lives than others. And sometimes if we are honest we cannot find our heart of thanks. This is indeed what it is to be human and to have human experiences as people of God.

And yet the scripture repeatedly reminds us that giving thanks is healthy for us and that a thankful heart brings joy and peace to our souls in the midst of our struggles.

What I am trying to do as this season comes into play is to remind myself of all the things I have to be thankful for and to look for things to give thanks for and to focus on the one who deserves my thanks.

Bishop's Message





Dear Beloved of God -

Cathy and I were privileged to travel with our Synod youth and home team leaders on the ABT Synod bus trip to and from the CLAY (Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth gathering) 2018 in Thunder Bay. Soon you will read some of my thoughts regarding the CLAY gatherings in the October-November edition of the *Canada Lutheran*. Here is the full article:

I'm already counting the days to CLAY 2020, the joint youth gathering between the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and the Anglican Church in Canada, which will take place in Calgary, AB., on the traditional territories of the Niitsitapi (Blackfoot) and the people of the Treaty 7 region at the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (SAIT).

I'm already counting the days to CLAY 2020 because I'm a youth gathering fanatic. I've been to several, well thirteen gatherings, and only missed two since being ordained a Pastor because I was facilitating a youth journey to the Lutheran Centre in Mexico City, and because I had just received a call to serve as Assistant to the Bishop.

I'm counting the days. Let me tell you why:

The bus trip. There is nothing better than travelling for several days on a packed bus handing out snacks, teasing, laughing, watching movies, singing, worshipping together, sharing the Eucharist, packing and unpacking. Some of my fondest and most vivid memories of Gatherings are of the bus trip. It is true, that it is all about the journey not the destination.

Forming community. There is nothing better than conversation, opportunity for prayer, listening, learning, building relationships with youth and leaders...and knowing that we are not alone.

Leadership development. There is nothing better than encouraging and affirming gifts for leadership in youth. Gathering after gathering, whether national or synodical, youth are given opportunities to share in and develop their leadership skills. Reading scripture at worship, being in charge of loading a bus, leading in prayer each morning as the bus doors close and the journey continues, gathering in small groups. Walking with a youth who begins as a gathering participant, becomes a home team leader and then storyteller at CLAY 2018.

Hearing stories from and learning from the youth. There is nothing better than hearing and learning from the youth. Gathering at CLAY 2018 under the theme, "Threads," there was much time spent on story-telling, story-tending, and what it truly means to listen. Five Large Group Gatherings (LGG) tended to the following themes/questions, including: How to listen to the stories of others, How to trust God in our unravelling, Where God fits within our stories, Good news stories from God, and Where do we go from here as unfinished but beloved children of God? Throughout CLAY 2018, there were opportunities for all to share our own stories and practice tending to the stories of others, with Home Team members, strangers, and new friends, and even Bishops!

Working together. There is nothing better than working together toward a common goal. At CLAY 2018, for example, with different home teams and CLAY volunteers, the youth continued to fulfil their commitment to address issues such as homelessness and unaffordable housing through the National Youth Project. By first learning of the issues contributing to poverty and homelessness, and then acting and advocating in supporting the local networks and agencies through partner programs, the youth visited a mock homeless shelter, gathered/donated socks, and sent postcards to the Federal Government and local Members of Parliament, in hopes of raising awareness and advocating for a greater responsibility and accountability in addressing the underlying causes of homelessness.

Learning together. There is nothing better than a common learning experience. While at CLAY 2018, for example, participants took part in the second-largest KAIROS blanket exercise in the world, and the largest ever by youth. This learning experience helped participants gain a better understanding of colonization and the process of displacement endured by Indigenous Peoples here in Canada. De-briefing in home teams which followed, was facilitated by Indigenous Elders and Leaders who were also present to provide support during the exercise.

Worshipping together. There is nothing better than singing, praying, laughing, crying, dancing, receiving, giving, Eucharist together. I'm already counting the days to CLAY 2020.

I'm already counting the days to CLAY 2020 because I'm a youth gathering fanatic. I'm looking forward to my fourteenth gathering.

Oh, and I'm counting the days to the Synod of Alberta and the Territories 2019 Youth Gathering, June 3-5! Watch for further information coming soon.


Sunday School Update

Judging by the enthusiasm of our first Sunday, Sunday School promises to be lively, fun and full of meaningful learning this year.

Our Sunday School area has undergone quite a transformation! Cleaning, sorting and organizing (followed by trips to the Recycling Depot, the Emergency Furniture and Clothing Depot and to the dump) took place in all of the Sunday School classrooms, meeting places and storage areas. Quite a task indeed but much needed and really fulfilling to accomplish! Sunday School at Messiah begins with the children gathering in the sanctuary, either sitting with their parents, or sitting together in the front pew. On certain 'special' Sundays, children will process together – possibly carrying or waving something! After a "Children's Time" at the front of the church, they will leave together to finish their Sunday School morning downstairs. Children remain together as a group for a short 'Opening' and then divide into classes and go to designated classrooms with their teacher. Children from Pre-K to Grade Six are welcome.



Sunday School will continue to use the 'WHIRL' curriculum. We start with Fall of Year B in the Revised Common Lectionary. Children will explore Whirl lessons with readings from the Season after Pentecost. October lesson titles are "Jesus Blesses Children", "A Camel Through a Needle" and "James and John".

Church Council Highlights from September 18, 2018

- Darlene Dahle opened with devotions, circulating an article by Rev. Daranne Harris from the September 2018
 Canada Lutheran entitled 'Called to serve' and read from John 13:14-15, 34-5. The article is part of a series on the
 ELCIC 'Call to Spiritual Renewal', focused on the topic of 'Serve'. We are called to follow Christ's example of service
 and of loving others. We each serve in unique ways, and need to think of ways to serve, but also move from thinking
 about service to doing it. Darlene concluded the devotion with prayer.
- The Annual Fall Planning Meeting is set for the evening of Sunday September 30 at Dave and Lois Larson's home.
 The intention is to set goals relevant to the needs of the Congregation for Committees and Council to focus on for the coming year. We will also start gathering information to make any changes to Committee Terms of Reference for the 2019 Annual General Meeting.
- Council continued to consider the topic of Stewardship, and how people could be found to do further research on this topic and potentially spearhead some small initiatives.
- There is an Area Gathering at Zion Lutheran Church, Bashaw on Saturday October 20. It does not require voting
 delegates, but individuals from Messiah are encouraged to go to help find ways for congregations in this Area to
 support each other and work together. Pre-registration is required but everyone is welcome.
- A portable Automated External Defibrillator (AED) has been purchased and placed in the Link. Odell will inform the congregation, and inquire about those interested in receiving training for its use.
- Arrangements are in place to split the position in the Messiah Front office between Doreen and Lori, as Doreen
 looks to decrease her time in the office. Pastor Calvin and Council will continue to monitor this and make
 adjustments as necessary.
- Good Samaritan has approached Messiah about offering training to individuals interested in offering visitation.
 Council will ask Witnessing to work with Bev/Calvin to explore if there are individuals interested in working on visitation and getting training to help.
- Council approved that Tova be approached about working an average of 3 hours a week from October until the end
 of June with senior youth, with Ivar, Bev and Calvin to set a pay scale based on consideration of past experiences
 with this sort of position at Messiah, present pay grids, and candidate skills, with money to be taken from the
 Dedicated Youth Fund.
- The annual Thanksgiving dinner in October will occur on Thanksgiving Sunday.
- Odell, on behalf of Messiah, has sent a letter to Bishop Kochendorfer confirming the monies voted at the Annual Meeting to be provided for the mission project for the Lutheran Church of Columbia, provided from Messiah's Mission Endowment fund.
- The meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer. The Next Regular Council Meeting is on October 16, 2018.

A Good Word from Rev. Brian Rude: Harvest in El Salvador



Harvest season. Even with snow or hurricanes, this is traditional harvest season in northern climes.

Throughout August, the Gospel texts from the Revised Common Lectionary were from John 6, focusing on bread--bread baked from the rich harvest yield, bread of life, assuring us of the full life offered us by the Bread of Life.

In June, we preached on the tiny but amazing mustard seed, producing beyond expectations.

Harvest in my world is a little different. Granted, corn is harvested in August, so that, at least, is comparable. From there, I have noted some marked differences--in my back yard, for example.

I have never planted wheat seed or mustard seed, nor harvested wheat or mustard. In fact, I have planted hardly any seeds in my yard. My primary garden discipline is to NOT pull the "weeds"--so unlike my childhood discipline . . let them grow, and see what they produce. In my 150 square metres of yard space, that has led to the volunteer growth and surprise scrumptuous harvests of:

--bananas--guavas--lemons--oranges--avocados--mangos--peppers--chipilínes--jocotes

While most fruit ripens at a predictable time of year, these harvests are spread out over all twelve months. I can rarely remember which fruit I'll be enjoying which month. And then, to further confuse me, the guava in our back yard ripens at a different time of year than the guava in our side yard. My banana stalk, which should fall, rot and regrow each year, lasted and produced for two years in a row--impossible, all Salvadorans insist.

So, gardening for me in my back yard requires restraint--NO WEEDING (such a different gardening philosophy from my childhood). With enough patience, I might someday be able to harvest the fruits of my adolescence in my own backyard in El Salvador, thanks to climate change (grapes, cherries, apples, apricots, peaches, pears, plums).

My *laissez-faire* back-yard gardening style does teach me lessons for life and ministry, however--sit back and watch the growth, from the most unlikely soil. Ordinary black dirt contains an unimaginable variety and quantity of seeds, I've discovered--in the case of my back yard, the seeds of a delightful variety of fruit trees.

Likewise, the soil of prison cells and "barrio" alleys contains an unimaginable variety and quantity of seeds. I have learned this same life lesson over and over these past three decades. A little attention may be healthy, but mostly one can sit back and delight in the unexpected growth, followed by harvest after harvest. Who could have imagined the variety and richness of fruit I delight in from these motley crews of Salvadoran youth, whether prison inmates or semi-street-kids?

God certainly has a miraculous hand in both the fruit seeds and the human seeds.






