Minister's Message

March has us moving into the season of Lent. I encourage you to participate in as many of the elements of this season leading up to Holy Week and Easter as you can.

March 1st isn't a part of Lent yet, but we do get to gather together. This year March 1st is the World Day of Prayer. We, at Messiah, are hosting this time together based on a service prepared by Christian women of Slovenia of various denominations and organized by a few women from various parishes in Camrose. The service happens at 1:30 pm. I hope you can attend. Prayer and signs of solidarity with other Christians is important.

Shrove Tuesday on March 5th (not really a part of Lent either, but it **is** "pre-Lent") will have a number of opportunities for you to find a good pancake supper somewhere. I've been able to participate with the good people at CLBI for the last couple of years. This is the day historically to prepare for Lent by using up many of the food items in a household that were given up during Lent (butter, eggs, fat are some of those items).


Ash Wednesday is on March 6th. We continue our tradition of mid-week services with other denominations who generally follow the church year practices: Anglican, Roman Catholic, Lutheran, Ukrainian Catholic, United and Church of God. This year, Ash Wednesday will be at Bethel Lutheran Church at 7pm. Mark it in your calendar and plan to attend. We use this time to remember our mortality and need for God. Tradition is to use the dried up palm branches used from the previous Palm Sunday to burn and use as ashes to mark our foreheads with the sign of the cross – a visible reminder of the mark of the cross on our brows given at our baptism.

We will continue to meet weekly on Tuesday nights (not Wednesday as we have in the past). The reason for this is scheduling issues for a number of our ecumenical partners. Again, mark Tuesday evenings at 7pm in your calendars and try to attend as many as you can. Our theme this year is "Think globally and act locally". It is valuable that we worship and pray together as a sign of our unity even in our diversity. Here's a list of dates and places all at 7pm:

- March 26 at Ukrainian Catholic Church
- April 2 at Camrose United Church
- April 9 at St. Andrew's Church

We will complete this time together for the Easter Vigil on Saturday April 20th at Augustana Campus Chapel. More news about this later.

Again, come to as much as you are able. Mark it down, write it on your hands, whatever it takes to remind you to be a part of this time of Christian fellowship, worship and prayer.

My Help Comes from the Lord

Psalm 121 is a passage of scripture that I have been meditating on and sitting with the last week. Today I thought I would share it with you and invite you to join me in spending time with this passage. It is a Psalm reminding us of God's constant protection and presence in all aspects of our lives.

I am struck, in these words, by the care and presence of God in all places we find ourselves in. There are times when all we can do is look to our maker and creator to take care of us. And in some circumstances we struggle to trust this is true especially if we are in place in our lives

where we cannot see or find God or even struggle to trust God is there for us.

This passage reminds us that God is indeed to be trusted at all times. There is no circumstance where we cannot look to our Lord to be our help. We are called in these words to simply look to God for help. This is indeed what God would have us each do.

This humble prayer and childlike prayer is one that God welcomes. We so often first try to figure out things on our own forgetting to look to our Lord for help. When we do...We are held. We are loved. We are protected from all sides. And God is indeed with us...even in those moments when we do not feel it or trust it...

Bishop's Message For Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders

Dear Beloved of God -

On the western slope of the Mount of Olives, just across the Kidron Valley from Jerusalem, sits a small chapel, *Dominus Flevit*, from the Latin: *Dominus* – "the Lord"; *Flevit* – "wept." The name of the chapel comes from Luke's Gospel, which contains not one but two accounts (13:31f; 19:41f) of Jesus weeping over Jerusalem. According to tradition, it was here, that Jesus wept over the city.

Inside the chapel, the altar is centered before a high arched window that looks out over the city of Jerusalem. Iron grillwork divides the view into sections, so that on a sunny day the effect is that of a stained-glass window except that what you see through the window is not colored glass, not an

artist's rendering of the holy city, but the city itself, with the Dome of the Rock in the bottom left corner and the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in the center (https://www.seetheholyland.net/church-of-dominus-flevit/).

Down below, on the front of the altar, is a picture, a mosaic medallion of a white hen with a golden halo around her head. Her red comb resembles a crown, and her wings are spread wide to shelter the pale, yellow chicks that crowd around her feet. There are seven of them, with black dots for eyes and orange dots for beaks. They look happy to be there. The hen looks ready to spit fire if anyone comes near her babies.

And around the edge of the medallion is a Latin text written in red: "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing!"

The last phrase of this text is set outside of the circle, in a pool of red underneath the chicks' feet: *you were not willing.* Jesus' words of lament: "Jerusalem, Jerusalem...;" of yearning: "How often have I desired to gather your children...;" of rejection: "And you were not willing."

Lament, yearning, rejection – for the city of Jerusalem, which Jesus sees across the valley, is a city like a chicken coop filled with pale, yellow chicks and at least one fox – Herod.

Jesus weeps over the city seeing that some of the chicks have taken to following the fox around. Others are huddled out in the open where anything with claws can get to them: helpless, unsafe, unprotected.

And Jesus, standing on the hillside, looking across the valley weeping, is like a white hen with a golden halo around her head who is clucking for all she is worth. Most of the chicks cannot hear her, and the ones that do make no response or ignore her clucking call.

Raised on the farm in the days when chickens often roamed freely around the chicken coop I have seen how a mother hen gathers her brood in protection if it began to rain or if the rooster was let loose or if it was dusk and time to settle down for the night or if the dog came to close. The hen's wings were large and seemed to expand to cover a surprisingly large number of chicks. The hen would simply cluck and somehow the chicks would know to gather under her wings. And not once did I see a chick ignore the hen.

But here, Jesus laments because the brood is unwilling to be gathered. This hen clucks and raises her wings but they do not come, they do not gather. And Jesus weeps.

The depth of his love, his lament, is profound – beyond words. Wings spread, breast exposed, he stands open in the most vulnerable posture in the world. Vulnerable to the dangerous, fearful, deathly work of this fox in the chicken coop, for if the fox wants them the fox will have to kill the hen first.

Which the fox does, as it turns out. He slides up on her one night in the yard while all the babies are asleep. When her cry wakens them, they scatter. She dies the next day where both fox and chicks can see her – wings spread, breast exposed.

In a few short days, in Jerusalem, this lament, this weeping will echo throughout the city and throughout all time. The compassion of God will be exposed for the entire world to see. For in Jerusalem, Jesus, like a mother hen spreading her wings to gather and protect her chicks, will spread his arms on the cross, spread them wide enough to embrace the world, spread them wide enough to embrace us for all time.

May you be sustained in your Lenten journey knowing this expansive, loving embrace.

Church Council Highlights from February 19, 2019

- Jonathan Hawkins opened the meeting with a reading from 'God is in the Small Stuff' by Bruce Bickel and Stan Jantz, based on Hebrews 10:25. The authors remind us that the 'church' is not just a place, activity, or institution, but that rather the essence of the church is our Christian family all the people who follow Christ. Everyone has a role and a way to contribute as part of an interactive relationship between people with Christ as a common bond. The reading seemed appropriate given Messiah's many volunteers, undertaking a wide variety of roles...and with the imminent appointment of a new nominating committee...as well as with what feels like the ongoing arrival of new faces/people who can each bring their own presence and skills to our part of the wider 'church'. The meeting then opened with the Lord's Prayer.
- Council reviewed the discussions from the February 10 Planning meeting. Questions posed included: are there particular topics/directions we should focus on, or is there a broader picture we can define for future priorities? Should we look to an external facilitator to assist in the process? Do we need to devote a longer session to meet/discuss this? It was felt that the five foci introduced at the meeting could be useful to launch further discussions (1. Care and inclusion of all people; 2. Strengthen the faith of people of all ages; 3. Encourage service beyond Messiah's door by providing human and material resources; 4. Be alert to issues of sustainability of our facility and finances; 5. Cultivate ways to enhance our use of technology for service and outreach). A broader planning discussion will be launched in the Fall.
- Odell will begin to compile Committee bylaw revision submissions, noting what changes have been recommended, and what further considerations need to be made (for example, do some activities need to be placed under new groups or delegated to the office?).
- Council approved the 2019 Nominating Committee, with Marie and Jim Brager, Lavona Broen, Elaine Taylor, and Gail Stolee as members, with Gail as Chair.
- Council received a letter from the Bishop, thanking Messiah for his recent visit. The letter will be placed on the bulletin board and an abbreviated version placed in the Messenger.
- Support Committee is beginning to prepare for roof repairs. Estimates are for a cost of around \$90,000 sometime in the next 5-10 years. Support recommends trying to raise and/or set aside \$15,000 a year for the next several years. Ivar suggested using the Special Projects fund to house this money.
- Support Committee reviewed a list of possible projects including office phone upgrades, sound system upgrades, and upgrades to improve sound for those using hearing aids. The priorities were discussed. Council thought hearing aid support and sound system upgrades were probably the priorities. Support will obtain further information.
- Council set the date for the Annual General Meeting on Sunday, June 9.
- Odell asked Bev to close the meeting in prayer.
- The Next Regular Council Meeting is Thursday, March 21, 2019 at 5:15 pm. Note that this date has changed to avoid the March 19 Lenten service.

News from El Salvador: Nayib Bukele – The new President

The polls were right all along. Nayib Bukele, the young businessman turned politician whose favorite communication medium is Facebook Live, won the presidency of El Salvador on Sunday with a 23 percentage point lead over his next closest rival, Carlos Calleja of ARENA. There will be no second round election.

And now: An Extract from Rev. Brian Rude's Response:

It was a monumental victory for many, a monumental defeat for others.

With this drastic shift away from bi-partisan presidential government, those loyal to the traditional two parties of the past three decades are anticipating the worst. Those who voted for the new-comer, GANA, first-round winners, are hoping for the best. With few policy pronouncements to go on, it's anybody's guess which direction El Salvador might head. Will this

government align itself with big business, the corporate sector? Or will it listen to and respond to the disadvantaged majority of the population? Whom will they consult? Whose interests will be given priority?

For decades, I have been intent on ministry among the most marginalized sectors of this society. This current administration has made such ministry virtually impossible, to the point of criminalizing it.

For three decades, Salvadorans have been led to believe, by successive governments, the major media, and the police, that Salvadorans want ever harsher treatment of youth, particularly gang-related youth, particularly prison inmates.

It has been three-and-a-half years since our prison ministries were suspended by this government's authorities. I have, in previous newsletters, applied Jesus's words from Matthew 25 to the restrictions on prison visitation in El Salvador. With the prison doors so firmly closed, shutting out all of us who would otherwise be visiting, it is timely to do so once again.

Jesus envisioned the possibility, even the likelihood, that there would be those who did not visit prison inmates. It seems that he did not contemplate the more extreme Salvadoran reality, where it is the prison authorities who prevent others from visiting prison inmates--not once, not twice, but for more than three years. This would be a special kind of goat, extending the imagery Jesus uses in his parable.

As an unfailing observer in Salvadoran elections, I was once again impressed with the competence and calm with which these elections were conducted. The elevated civic spirit was evident throughout the country throughout the day. If an election observer were looking for "excitement" on Election Day, El Salvador proved once again that this would not be the country to come looking for such. If one were seeking a rich, lo-o-o-ng day of interaction with a broad cross-section of marvelous Salvadoran citizens, I would highly recommend such an immersion.

Lent... What's it about?



What's it really all about? What are we living for? Are my values Godly values? Is the way I spend my precious, finite minutes of life really the best? And what does God want from me, anyway?

Ash Wednesday asks and answers all these questions. Specifically the part of Ash Wednesday when the pastor makes two swipes of a dirty thumb across my forehead and says, "Remember, human, that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."


The gesture and the words express our lowly condition: Time will destroy us despite the defensive ramparts and barricades we construct with our money, our fame, our beauty, our power, and so on. Since death and dust are inevitable, Ash Wednesday asks us, why do we human beings build our silly defenses AS IF they will protect us? Why put up barriers when instead we can use our time, our wealth, our creativity and power to live free, abundant lives for God's purposes?

Ash Wednesday declares us guilty of the great sins of failing to love the Lord Our God with all our being and failing to love our neighbor as ourselves. Lent calls us to repentance and self examination. And exactly this is the meaning of repentance — to turn away from sin and towards God.

How we use our lives and what we are living for — these are, ultimately, issues of stewardship. Ash Wednesday dramatically condemns us, all of us, for being poor stewards of the bountiful lives that God gives us. Ash Wednesday reminds us that we are "dead people walking" and sets the tone for our Lenten self examination.

Of course, Ash Wednesday isn't the end of the story. But for now, meditate on these words: "Remember, human, that you are dust, and to dust you shall return!"
