





#### Minister's Message



Just around the corner: Pentecost Sunday, Confirmation Day, and Annual General Meeting. These are wonderful celebration times for us as a congregation, so I hope you can be a part of them. (For your convenience they are all happening on the same day this year!)

Thank you again, for your presence, prayers and commitment to being apart of this ministry that aims to "share Jesus with all people". This world continues to be in sore need of Jesus' healing and life-giving touch. You are an important part of sharing Jesus in your unique ways.

I want to touch on a couple possibilities coming up for us here at Messiah to be bearers of good news. One such possibility is to again sponsor refugees from other parts of the world. Based on

our continued connections with CLWR and some extended families of people living in Camrose, we have received preapprovals for a family of 4 and another single man to be sponsored by Messiah. Both the family of 4 and the single person have "co-sponsors" (relatives) who have committed to providing housing and other supports. Another congregation is probably willing and able to commit to funding of the single person. We currently have almost enough cash in our Refugee Designated Fund to fully sponsor the family of 4 with the input of the co-sponsor. The Camrose Refugee Centre is very willing and able to provide some of the extra "personal" support that will be necessary to welcome these new arrivals to our community. The expectation is that both units will very soon be able to support themselves, but our commitment is for a full year. We are expecting the process to still be over a year before they are able to arrive, but we are being asked to commit now with our part so there is no rush as the people arrive. Please pray for this situation and how you might be blessed by God to help out in Jesus' name.

The idea here comes from a number of fronts: a Canada Lutheran article on loneliness, conversations with people who find it a burden to cook only for themselves, other conversations that desire to build some kinds of small groups to foster feelings of belonging.

What is being proposed as part of a response to these concerns is to find people who desire to host small groups. These groups could gather to eat, or visit, or do just about anything together. If the group wishes to do this regularly, wonderful! If it is a one-and-done, that's OK too.

The plan is to start by "hosting hosts" on June 13, 2019 at 5:57 pm here at Messiah. There will be a meal and discussion of how people might go about hosting. We will discuss things like: Who to invite, what to do, what to eat, what to talk about, when to do it, how to go about inviting – good practical things like that. I hope this might be something interesting for you to try out. We'll have a signup sheet during Fellowship Coffee after worship for the next two Sundays – and you can always call me!

Do you have an idea of some need that is not being met that Messiah might be poised to meet? Maybe you'd like to join in with something that's already happening but don't know how to go about getting involved. Let's talk.

### Bishop's Message For Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders

Dear Beloved of God -

We have gathered at the rural church. Many have journeyed for several hours to be present and to participate in the service of ordination and installation. Once the worship begins and the procession has landed me near the altar, I look out over those whom the Spirit has assembled: farmers, council and call committee members, several children and a handful of youth, family and friends, and seminary professors and staff and colleagues.

It seems as if even the sounds of the building are part of a sacred conversation between congregation, God and the one to be ordained and installed. A yellowed fluorescent light hums its the service. The microphone on the lectors square when the reader gets too close. The air from the

way through the service. The microphone on the lectern squeals when the reader gets too close. The air from the furnace whooshes into the sanctuary causing the banners to wave.

Those to be ordained and installed will spend their years baptizing babies, helping to deliver calves in the middle of the night, burying husbands who died too soon, negotiating debates about how to pay for the new church roof...and then every Sunday, they will stand in the pulpit and try to make holy sense of it all.

Mid-March I prepared this article, originally for the June *Canada Lutheran*, while basking in the glow of participating in the final evaluation of candidates for rostered ministry. It is my favorite time of year, spent reviewing written examination materials and candidate dossiers and participating in the colloquy (the examination interview).

The final evaluation is a time to review and inquire in depth into the candidate's readiness for rostered ministry, and to determine that the candidate meets the requirements established by the National Church.

The examining committee, comprised of capable, insightful, experienced and compassionate members, considers the following determinants of readiness: theological and academic competence, spirituality and faith commitment, personal integrity and leadership abilities, and call to ministry and ministry gifts.

It is my favorite time of year, for I have walked with the candidates together with the synod candidacy committee, and the seminary, and the internship placement supervisor and congregation, and family and friends and seminary classmates to this point of final evaluation.

And truly, marvelously, wonderfully I have seen God at work in the life of each candidate.

And now, the procession has landed me near the altar where I preside at the service of ordination and the area dean presides over the installation.

The plan of the newly ordained and installed is no strategic plan for "turning this church around." No, their only ambition—their call—is to be next in a long line of faithful pastors serving with and among this congregation seeking to join God in God's mission of reconciliation and restoration.

With the service over and the obligatory pictures taken, we make our way to the community hall for a potluck dinner. Everyone plops into metal folding chairs and eats, laughs and gossips. Tables are filled with casseroles, salads and a multitude of homemade desserts. Children squeal as they chase each other around the room and out the doors of the hall.

I overhear a story about snow tires. They could be discussing their anxieties about the future of family farms, the economy or "just where is this country heading?" But there is none of that on this day. Even the small talk has a lilt to it.

I understand why, when their new pastor enters the room, many are simply there to extend a warm welcome. One after another they get up from the tables, wipe their hands and approach the pastor for a handshake or a hug. Many have tears in their eyes.

This is a Eucharistic feast. A new pastor has come. To the congregation it is a sign that God knows how to find them. The holiness of the room is so apparent that I almost take off my shoes. No one wants to leave—certainly not me, and certainly not the new pastor.

This is my glimpse into a mystery about our church that is hidden from the statistics and anxiety about its decline.

I have no idea what hardships lie ahead for this congregation, or how long it will even exist. But I know that its people are filled with expectancy. In their midst is another highly capable pastor who is prepared to bring thousands of years of theological hope to bear on their community —a pastor who finds holiness by sitting in a community hall swapping stories about snow tires, and who every Sunday will stand in the pulpit and try to make holy sense of all of it.

#### **Church Council Highlights from May 28, 2019**

Chris Hohm shared some excerpts from 'Finding Common Ground' in which the author explores how to communicate with those outside the Christian community. He read several excerpts: the author sharing his faith as part of Campus Crusade in the 1970s; the encounter between Jesus and the woman at the well; Christs comments on farming where those who seed and nurture are not necessarily present at the harvest; Jesus's parable of building houses on the rocks and the sand. We must not only understand what Jesus said, we also need to apply it in our lives. Chris then opened the meeting in prayer.

Council spent some time considering what has been accomplished this year, and how we will continue the visioning process of the last year.

The chair of the Nominating Committee reported that with a person interested in serving on Witnessing, Witnessing and Support will have 7 members each, Worship, Learning, and Service will each have 5.

The Committees have no more changes to the Bylaws from those published in the Annual Reports.

Council discussed how it would prefer to deal with urgent issues between Council Meetings. The President will consult all Council members by email, if an adequate number of responses is not received by the deadline, the President will phone the Executive.

A motion will be brought to the AGM to end the Debt Retirement Fund and transfer the remaining funds to the Capital Fund.

The Treasurer will provide a sheet with risks and benefits for alternate Term Deposit placements for the congregation. Funds are due for reinvestment in 2021. A decision needs to be made at the 2020 AGM.

Calvin reported that his Seminary Conference focused on what First Nations expectations are from the Christian community (the primary focus was on the Anglican Church). The goal is less about monetary compensation, but rather recognition of harm done and improving processes moving forward. The Seminary is leaving their current leased building to find a space more suited to their needs and finances.

Don Rebus' appointment to the Service Committee, previously approved by email was minuted.

The Fellowship Kitchen has been cleaned. The Wednesday Workers are installing some new cupboard doors, some missing instructions have been restored, and the freezer has been cleaned out. David will take the issue of odour in the Friendship Room to Support for further investigation.

Pastor Calvin's Report: spoke about the request from the Refugee Center to sponsor a family of four and a single man. The President will contact Yvonne Myrehaug at the Refugee Centre, to find out what is expected from Messiah. He will then email Council for a decision on what will be brought to the AGM.

The Service Committee is planning a supper with members interested in hosting small groups for a meal and discussion.

The T-Coil has been installed in the floor but is not yet operational; the temporary T-Coil on the west side of the sanctuary is still functioning.

The Treasurer reported that our current bank balance is \$148,642 with the 2018-19 deficit \$38,000. All deficits from the Mortgage Burning Celebration have been covered.

We adjourned the meeting with the Lord's Prayer.

Thank you to my church family.



## Great News Concerning Brian Rude The Rev. Dr. Brian Rude: In Mission with El Salvador



#### **Graduation Announcement:**

Congratulations to the Rev. Dr. Brian Rude who graduated on Wednesday evening, May 8, *in absentia*, from the University of Toronto / Toronto School of Theology / Knox College, with a Doctor of Ministry (DMin) degree. The title of his doctoral thesis is: "Dialogue as a Faith Response to Social Violence in El Salvador: A Pastoral-Theological Analysis of the Response of *IPAZ* (Pastoral Initiative for Peace) to Gang Violence," which he successfully defended at the TST, U of T, on 29 March, 2019.

#### Kibuye Hope Hospital - Burundi, Africa

Submitted by Cecelia Watts who recently returned from a 3 week trip to Burundi.

Burundi is a beautiful country, but is home to almost 11 million of the world's poorest and hungriest people. It is situated just below Rwanda and between Tanzania and the Democratic Republic of Congo. It is a very small country (about the size of the state of Massachusetts). Life expectancy is 50.

After the civil war (1993-2005), the Free Methodist Church of Burundi started a university in the city of Bujumbura. The Kibuye Hope Hospital in rural Burundi (140 km away) has been operated by the church since the 1940's. It survived the horrors of the civil war and was kept operating as a clinic. Six young doctors from the U.S came in 2013 and work with the university to make it a teaching hospital.

My son, George, felt the call to teach at the University after he completed his studies in business in 2014. They arrived in Bujumbura in April of 2015, just in time for the election of a president, which resulted in a coup. They were sent to Rwanda for awhile, came back and taught again for a couple of months, but the fighting in the city was so bad that the mission sent them up to Kibuve to be administrator of the hospital in this rural area where all was peaceful. George and Susan and their 4 children moved there in January 2016. There is now 1 Canadian doctor and 8 American doctors as well as several Burundian doctors and nurses. Also, there is an engineer who is in charge of a very busy building program. The hospital is expanding. A pediatric ward is presently under construction.

There has been a feeding program at the hospital since the 1970's. There are now 265 children coming with their mothers on Monday and Friday mornings. They are given a bowl of busoma (a high-protein porridge made at a "factory" on the hospital grounds, consisting of soy, sorghum and corn ... looks like cream of wheat). Susan hard boils 265 eggs every Friday to give extra protein. Then while the mothers register their children, she cleans and bandages

sores, mostly on legs and feet of the children and mothers. She also visits and works with malnourished children in the hospital (there are usually about 100). Every month they visit an orphanage where she has taken babies whose mothers have died in the hospital. They bring baby formula and busoma to help in feeding the babies.

The missionaries have built houses and live on a compound near the hospital compound. There is a 3-room school for their children. Two of my grandchildren go to a high school for missionary children in Kenya. They come home for a month every 3 months.

All of these missionaries raise their own support and are under a mission called "Serge" out of Pennsylvania. This hospital has the only surgeons and eye doctor outside of the city of Bujumbura. The ophthalmologist does many cataract operations each day. Blindness from cataracts is very common and keeps the farmers from their daily work.

## News from Papua New Guinea from the Perspective of "Mission Aviation Fellowship" as shared by Ryan and Siobhain Cole

There are 26 bush airstrips that we fly to regularly within 50 miles of our home base, Telefomin. That's only a 20 minute flight! Each airstrip provides access to the outside world to multiple villages, that's well over 50 communities that we serve out of Telefomin alone.

That sure keeps Ryan and the 2 other pilots here very busy!!!

Thank you for your friendship, support and most importantly, prayers, which enable us to be here in Papua New Guinea providing a life-line for some of the world's most isolated people.

#### **Opportunities For Designated Giving**

As a part of the ongoing maintenance and improvements at Messiah Lutheran Church the Support Committee, with the approval of Church Council, is informing our members of two projects that are in need of financial assistance going forward.

- 1) Improvements to our sound system beginning with the installation of a T coil that will assist the hearing of those with hearing aids that have a setting that connects to this system. Other improvements to the sound system will be made as we can fund them.
- 2) Starting and building up a designated fund over a number of years for the replacement of the shingles on the sanctuary roof, as well as for the replacement of the covering on the flat roof areas will prepare us for this inevitable cost.

These are major projects that will require significant financial resources so we must prepare in advance. More specific dollar amounts will be supplied later for your information.

Just a reminder that your REGULAR GIVING should not be used for these projects, since our operational budget continues, but as you are able your designated gifts will make these projects possible.






