Minister's Message



Grace to you and peace from God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Our mission is to "Share Jesus Christ with all people". This is a very Christian mission. Jesus' followers were told to "Go" at the end of each of our gospel stories. In Matthew, Jesus tells his disciples to "Go... make disciples... baptizing... and teaching them..." In Mark's account an angel instructs the women to "Go, tell...". Luke's gospel has the disciples waiting for a while, with the purpose that they would be "clothed" with the Holy Spirit to proclaim the good news of Jesus death and resurrection to all nations starting at home (Jerusalem). John records that Jesus told Mary Magdalene to "Go... and say..."; and later Jesus says to those huddled together in fear "I send you." So, we are in good company indeed!

How will each of us (and "we" collectively) do this Sharing of Jesus? I don't know exactly how, but there have been a few things happening in our community and society as a whole that may help to guide our next steps.

Recently, three (or four, depending on how you count) parishes in our immediate vicinity no longer have called pastoral leadership. Bashaw/Edberg/New Norway/St. Peters (2 parishes cooperating together) had their pastor retire in September. Armena Parish (Scandia/St. Joseph) and the Bawlf Parish (Bawlf, Skudesness & Zion) both had their pastors resign and return to the USA. There are questions about how these people will be served by Word and Sacrament ministry into the future. What is God saying in the midst of this?

Bishop Larry and the Assistant to the Bishop Prema were at Bethel on October 1 to begin a conversation around what might happen in this area. At the meeting, we were given a chart showing the decline of numbers of congregations, but more strikingly, the decline of pastors. Between 2009 and 2019 our synod has gone from 108 pastors to 80. Of the 80 current pastors 45% of them (36 of 80) are between the ages of 61 and 70. Another 21 (26%) are between 51 and 60 – a full 71% over age 50! There are very few new students in our seminaries – even though seminary education is much more accessible now than it was even 20 years ago.

We need to be part of a conversation with our neighboring siblings in Christ to discover how God is guiding us into this new realty. What ways are there for us all to build each other up? We are right now working on naming each of our congregation's challenges and gifts in order that we might share with each other and determine if there are ways for us to work together.

The Bishop outlined some options that might be considered:

- Closing some buildings (very, very painful).
- Returning to "circuit riders" that we had early in our Alberta history.
- A larger parish with multiple pastors (each providing Word and Sacrament and then possibly making use of a team approach in other areas of ministry).
- Of course all of these options need to rely heavily on the multiple and varied gifts of our lay people.

I trust that the conversation will continue in earnest soon.



How do we Share Jesus Christ with all People? We begin with where we are – and remember that Jesus tells us not to get stuck huddled together, but to "Go". I am certain that we will be amazed at the wonders that God will do in, with and through us.

Minister's Message



Reflections of God's Light!

We are into the season of pumpkins, gardens, vegetables, harvest and of course Halloween... which is also connected with All Saints Day.

It is a rich season of gathering in the gifts of God... and giving thanks. It is also a time for fun and laughter for families and children.

This past Friday evening at the church we had a wonderful time of pumpkin carving and decorating Halloween cookies with our young families. I wanted to share of this time with you because so often you don't get to hear of these lovely gatherings.

We had about 12 kids carving pumpkins... and about 6 of our families represented with kids of all ages participating.

The creativity in the faces in the pumpkins were amazing. Everyone brought their own unique ideas and as you can see by the picture of our pumpkins they were all wonderful. It was quite something to turn off the lights and see the candle light peering through the carvings. You can imagine the delight in each child to share the face of their pumpkin and enjoy the faces of the others.



We sat down then beside our display of pumpkin faces and admired them.

Everyone shared first of their favorite Halloween character and then we talked about our pumpkin faces. We noted that each face was absolutely unique... not one the same. And then we commented on how God has made each of their faces so unique in their own way...then we moved to talking about how the light inside of the pumpkin makes the faces shine brightly.

As we pondered this we were reminded that the light of God within each of us is what shines out through the uniqueness of each of God's people... and specifically their beautiful faces. We agreed that we would now see pumpkin faces reminding ourselves of God's light shining through our faces.

In confirmation this week we also talked about how we are all created in God's image and therefore we are also a reflection of God's image.

This is such a simple and yet so profound a concept isn't it? Sometimes the simplest of children's stories can reach our hearts in a new ways.

Each one in this world is created so beautifully and uniquely in God's image...and the light that God puts within us as God's people reflects God's incredible love through our faces... and our lives in the world.

It strikes me that if we could look at one another and notice the light of God's love in the eyes of that person... how we might see all people so much differently. We might even appreciate more fully others around us.

So often we move to judgement or evaluation of another of God's people...instead of seeing the face of God in them. Each of us in our church and in the world... are beloved of God created by God and so valuable to God. Let us also value the creation of our God in the face and lives of our neighbor.

This is so beautifully put in the words of Matt as used in the Message...

Matthew 5:14-16 The Message (MSG)

"Here's another way to put it: You're here to be light, bringing out the God-colors in the world. God is not a secret to be kept. We're going public with this, as public as a city on a hill. If I make you light-bearers, you don't think I'm going to hide you under a bucket, do you? I'm putting you on a light stand. Now that I've put you there on a hilltop, on a light stand—shine! Keep open house; be generous with your lives. By opening up to others, you'll prompt people to open up with God, this generous Father in heaven."

The light of God is to be shared with the world. Indeed shine your unique light reflecting the light of God's love and recognize the light of God's creation in each person you meet.

Let's join our children is remembering the light in them reflected brightly. As we all shine together in our own unique way... God's light shines brightly.

Bishop's Message For Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders



Our Synod seeks to live out of four Mission Priorities reviewed and approved at our 2019 Synod Convention. One of these Mission Priorities is Collaborative Partnerships. Here, we say in part that, "Listening to the Spirit's leadership we are intentional in developing deeper relationships, sharing of resources, and partnership ministries within Areas of the Synod."

Together, in the Synod of Alberta and the Territories and across the ELCIC, we are experiencing several common realities: increased congregational vacancies, decreased congregational finances and participation, fewer pastoral graduates, to name a few. In the midst of these realities we continue to journey together seeking to discern God's work in our communities and to join God in God's mission.

With our Collaborative Partnerships Mission Priority in mind, as well as our current context, I invited 28 congregations, and lay and rostered leaders, to gather in three regions of the West and East Central Areas of our Synod in early October for a Collaborative Partnership Gathering. 23 out of 28 congregations were represented at the three regional gatherings.

October 1 – Bethel Lutheran, Camrose – over 60 participants representing 12 congregations

October 2 - Peace Lutheran, Leduc - over 30 participants representing 6 congregations

October 7 – Peace Lutheran, Innisfail – 53 participants representing 5 congregations

I am grateful for the presence of God's Spirit among us and guiding us as we gathered. And, I am grateful for the participation of so many.

The goal of the evening was to kindle conversation and extend a call to further conversations and collaboration. The goal was to frame and reframe how we see ourselves: where are we at? What is our current reality? The goal of the evening was to engage in conversation sharing where God is at work, and where God is calling us to. The goal was to

spark conversation about what journeying forward together might look like. The goal was to begin conversation and to continue these conversations at the upcoming Area Gatherings.

During each Gathering, time was spent in prayer and in Dwelling in the Word considering John 21:1-14. What stands out for you in the text? a word? a phrase? What questions do you have of the text? Considering the gathering and current realities what might the Spirit of God be saying to us tonight?

Following the Collaborative Partnership Gathering at Peace Lutheran, Innisfail, Vivian Holtby, a member at Grace Lutheran, Wetaskiwin and a member of the West Central Area Leadership Team forwarded this reflection on John 21:1-14 to me, as well as a picture. I share Vivian's reflection with her permission.

Lord, I'm so tired and I'm so weary, but I must go on you say.

I found 153, more or less, and I thought- what do I do now?

So, I brought them to breakfast with me! You were there waiting with your few. We sat in that place, there in the beach and we- those already there and those brought by me/us- breakfasted together.

I'm no longer tired, weary, lonely as I found a fisherman's net full of believers, just on the other side of the boat! Thank you, Lord, for leading me where I needed to go- out there in untried water, so to speak, so that I might find you and your people where you wanted me to find You and them!

Try the other side of the boat!



Church Council Highlights from October 22

We began with a word from Corrie ten Boom. "Everyone was waving palm branches and throwing garments on the road and singing praises, do you think that for one moment it even entered the head of that donkey that any of it was for him?" Ps 115:1 *Not to us, Lord, not to us but to your name be the glory, because of your love and faithfulness*. May we humbly carry Jesus.

Council is in planning mode which needs now to include the reality of the many small and struggling area congregations. While there are a few pastors and others doing pulpit supply, there are only three ordained clergy serving full time in this area of thirteen congregations. What is God calling us to? Where will God lead us?

There will be a student led Alpha Bible Study group at the Comp in the new year. They meet weekly over lunch. Council moved to provide them a food gift card in the value of \$250.

New, larger lettering and a new plexiglass cover for our outdoor sign is coming.

Due to reduced benevolence giving to the Synod, cuts in support for Campus Ministries have been necessary. Although Augustana is not funded in this way, please remember the students.

The Outreach School will not be able to operate, even temporarily, from Messiah because of zoning restrictions. The program has been running out of the Community Centre which is no long considered structurally sound. There had been exploratory talks about allowing them to use the basement for a few months until their new facility is ready.



HISHAM'S STORY

Millions of Syrian children have been away from their homes for five year or more. Jordan is now home to 670,000 displaced Syrians. Hisham al-Miqdad is a Syrian teenager whose family fled to Jordan during the Syrian war. He's a boy with big dreams, but a few years ago, those



dreams looked totally out of reach.
Schools in Jordan were crumbling and over-crowded, and sometimes lacking even basics like windows and bathrooms.

Hisham's school was rehabilitated as part of a partnership between CLWR, The Government of Canada, and Jordan's Department of Education. Schools are

getting new windows and doors, bathroom facilities, lighting and playgrounds. Teachers are receiving training on preventing violence and dealing with trauma. You can watch Hisham's story at clwr.org/papershapes.

Miracles in Burundi - an Update From the Watts Family

Greetings to you, our brothers and sisters in Christ, from rural Burundi, where the rains have returned and we continue to pray for a good harvest for the many hungry people around us.

Living here, and working as a missionary, is a peculiar life in many ways. However, one of the things that is common to us is that we still have many of the same struggles you do, they just might look different for us.

There have been times in my life where doubt has set in. I can doubt God's sovereignty, his goodness, sometimes even his presence. When that happens I do find comfort knowing that I am in good company. Martin Luther, mother Theresa, and even John the Baptist all struggled with doubt.

At one point John was not sure if Jesus from Nazareth, his very own cousin, was in fact the Messiah that he and all the Jewish people had been waiting for. John was in prison so he sent some friends to ask Jesus if He was the one. When they got to Jesus they said, "John the Baptist sent us to you to ask, 'Are you the one who is to come, or should we expect someone else?'" (Luke 7:19) Jesus did not respond with doctrine, or philosophy or theology, but with a very practical answer. He told John that signs that the Kingdom of God, the place where God's will comes to earth, would be the evidence that Jesus was the Messiah. "Go back and report to John what you have seen and heard." is Jesus response recorded in Luke chapter 7. The blind receive sight, the lame walk, those who have leprosy are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the good news is proclaimed to the poor"

Here in Kibuye we have the distinct privilege of seeing first hand these things. Every week people come to our hospital and gain back the ability to walk. Blind people come to the eye clinic and receive sight. Good news is proclaimed to the poor. I want to share just one story of this, as you are directly involved in the work that goes on here, but you don't get to see the incredible changes that happen in the lives of people.

Susan first noticed 5 year old Dorine and her mother, who we call 'Mama Dorine', at our malnutrition feeding program. Every Friday and Monday over 250 children come to the feeding program. When we got to Kibuye four years ago there were about 70. They are weighed and measured, they are fed porridge and given some to take home. The hospital chaplain shares with them, they sing, and he prays for them. Susan treats wounds, and encourages the mothers and children. Sometimes it is to help them get an appointment, or to pay for a prescription. Sometimes it is to talk to them, to hear their stories, for them to know that someone cares about their suffering.

Even amongst these families who are so poor that they cannot feed their children, Dorine and her mother stuck out as exceptionally poor. 'Mama Dorine' is a widow with two children, who has no family to help her. This makes her a very vulnerable person in Burundian society. Dorine has a horribly deformed hand as a result of a terrible burn she suffered falling into the family cooking fire when she was very little. Susan asked them if Dorine had ever seen a doctor. She never had.

Susan kept encouraging them to come to the hospital to see if our surgeons could help her. For probably a month they kept backing out, scared off by the potential cost even though Susan had told them she would go with them and pay for the visit. Finally they went and our surgeon said there was something that could be done, but she was so malnourished that she needed to gain weight. For several months she got extra food so she would be ready in time for a visiting plastic surgeon to do the first procedure.

During this time she kept telling Susan that the roof on her house leaked so bad that her kids were cold at night. One Friday after the feeding program we jumped in the Land Cruiser and drove to her home. Her house was just over 10 km away. That takes her over three hours to walk. Barefoot, carrying Dorine, up and down hills, two times a week, just to come and get the porridge that they receive at our feeding program. It was shocking to us, and we have seen a lot of mud-brick houses.

After talking with our local partners they agreed that she was really some of the poorest of the poor, and we tried to figure out how we could help. We paid for some local men to tear off her old roof, and we had some workers from our hospital construction team build a new metal roof, put in new doors, and gave her two solar lanterns.

Dorine has now had her first surgery, and is scheduled to have her second procedure next month. Mama Dorine has started to weave baskets, that we buy from her to sell to visitors and use for gifts, and so now she has a way of actually earning money to support her family.

I share this story with you for three reasons:

First, to let you know of the work that you are involved in. Your financial and prayer support allows stories like Dorine's to take place.

Two, because it is a beautiful story of holistic redemption. Dorine has received physical healing,

her and her brother and their mother eat better. They have a safe house. They hear the gospel from the chaplain at our hospital. They now have a way to sustain themselves financially.

Third, to encourage you (and me) that this Jesus we read about in the Bible is still active and moving through his body the church. Every week in our small village, on a small hill in the middle of the poorest and hungriest, most medically under-served country in the world; the lame walk, the blind see, the hungry are fed and good news is proclaimed to the poor.

Is this Jesus of Nazareth the one? I pray that this story of what his people are doing is an encouragement to you to see that he is.



As a part of the ongoing maintenance and improvements at Messiah Lutheran Church the Support Committee, with the approval of Church Council, is informing our members of two projects that are in need of financial assistance going forward.

- 1) Improvements to our sound system that began with the installation of a T coil that assists the hearing of those with hearing aids that have a setting that connects to this system. Other improvements to the sound system will be made as we can fund them.
- 2) Starting and building up a designated fund over a number of years for the replacement of the shingles on the sanctuary roof, as well as for the replacement of the covering on the flat roof areas will prepare us for this inevitable cost.

These are major projects that will require significant financial resources so we must prepare in advance. More specific dollar amounts will be supplied later for your information.

Over the next four years, we will take a closer look at each of the following four areas:

PRAY

2019–2020: We are called to daily prayer. Whether this is an area you are completely comfortable with or something you have struggled with, there is no one way to pray, nor is there any one time to pray. Pray whenever and however you feel comfortable.

READ

2020–2021: We are called to daily reading of the Bible. There are many ways to include reading the Bible into your daily life.

WORSHIP

2021–2022: We are called to regular attendance at communal worship and regular personal devotions. Consider ways that you can increase your worship life.

LOVE

2022–2023: We are called to live generous lives. Love includes community and service. Love encompasses all. *And now faith, hope and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love* (1 Corinthians 13:13).



PRAY

We are called to daily prayer. Whether this is an area you are completely comfortable with or it's something you want to grow, a daily prayer practice is very individual —there is no one right way to pray! Pray whenever and however you feel comfortable. And if you're looking for ways to grow your daily prayer, here are a few thoughts to consider:

- Set aside a bit of time each day to prayer. In this busy and hectic world, find time each day and commit to spending 5, 10, 15 minutes or more focusing on prayer. Pencil it in your calendar so it becomes a regular part of your daily life.
- Be specific about your prayer practice. As the names of people who you want to pray for come into your mind, write down their names so that when you get to the time you have set aside for prayer, you can pray for that person by name.
- Consider using a daily devotion (such as Eternity for Today or Praying the Catechism) to focus your prayer practice. These resources include a scripture reading, a reflection and a prayer or some guidance on what to include in your prayers.
- Start a journal. Keep a journal and include in there your prayers. Commit to writing in it daily.
- Follow the Anglican Lutheran Cycle of Prayer. For each Sunday there are intentions for specific groups in both the ACC and ELCIC. Look around for other prayer cycles that you'd like to include as part of your prayer life.
- Offer prayers for others when you feel they could use a prayer. You may be surprised how often this will be a welcome gesture.




