

In-Person Worship at Messiah Resumes on September 13, 2020

Messiah's Church Council met on September 2nd and approved the Worship Committee's recommendation that in-person worship at Messiah Lutheran Church will resume on **September 13th, and Sunday School on September 27th 2020.**

We have been so fortunate to gather as a faith community through TV broadcast or online streaming through YouTube but many have been looking forward to worshipping together again in person.

The following guidelines have been established for the safe return to our building for worship:

- Entrance will be only from two doors either the "link" door on the east side or the "alley" door on the west side. Seating within the sanctuary will flow from whichever entrance you arrive at, with the "link" door leading you to sit on the east side and the alley door leading you to sit on the west side. (refer to map on page 4)
- Please arrive in plenty of time to be seated. Call the office if you are able to help usher.
- We encourage you to use the hand sanitizer which will be at each entrance.
- We will need to practice the principle of physical distancing, staying 2 metres (6 feet)
 apart and using only every second pew. We will need to physically distance as we move
 into and out of our worship space as well. Ushers will be there to guide you. (Families
 and cohorts are welcome to sit closely together.) Ushers will lead you to your seat and
 at the end of the service will guide dismissal beginning with the back pews.
- The washrooms in the hallway to the Fellowship Centre will be open as will the one at the back of the sanctuary.
- To help with the safety of others, please wear a mask, if that is possible for you. Masks will be available at the church but you are welcome to wear your own.
- Offerings can be placed in the offering plate upon entry or you might prefer other options such as mailing a cheque, e-transfer, or drop off at the office.
- Our worship team will provide music, but the congregation will not join in singing out loud. Instead, we invite you to sing in your head, hum along, or meditate with the music. If Worship folders are used they will be placed in the pews ahead of time. Hymnals will not be used.

- The "Peace of the Lord" will be shared by waving, nodding or bowing rather than with physical contact such as the shaking of hands or hugging.
- Initially, we will not be celebrating Holy Communion.
- With your permission, we will keep a list of names of people attending. This list will be kept confidentially by the church office for only two weeks and used by Alberta Health Services for contact tracing only in the event of a COVID-19 case in our midst.
- Sunday School is tentatively scheduled to begin on September 27th. Unless they are in Sunday School, children are to remain with a parent or guardian at all times.

Our Synod office has also communicated to congregations returning to in-person worship the following health precautions:

- Staff, volunteers and worshippers who are ill or have any common COVID-19 symptoms
 (cough, fever, shortness of breath, runny nose, sore throat) that are not related to a preexisting illness or health issue must not attend. Before each gathering the use of the online
 self-screening tool found at "myhealth.alberta.ca" by clicking on "COVID-19
 MyHealth.Alberta.ca patient instruction and other important links", then clicking on "COVID19 Self-Assessment" is recommended.
- Individuals who have travelled internationally in the last 14 days must not attend.
- Those with underlying medical conditions and those over 65 years old should be aware that they are at higher risk of experiencing worse symptoms if they contract the virus.
- Worshippers are asked to practice good hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette by coughing or sneezing into their elbow or sleeve.



Minister's Message



After he (Jesus) had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray.

When evening came he was there all alone, Matthew 14:23

Verse 23 from Matthew's gospel does indeed end with a comma. That time of Jesus' life was a whirlwind of activity and in the midst of that Jesus took time: to pray and to be by himself. But it was just a comma, a pause, in his life for the real work he was called to do. I hope you have been able to take pauses in your life when you need it.

At the moment I am very much in need of a long comma. In a few days I will be going away for three weeks of "holy-days" but you will be reading this near the end of my "pause time". So in some ways this will seem out of place to you. (I need to write now to meet the necessary deadlines.) Never-the-less it is only a time to pause – a comma in our lives.

This pause for Jesus was just a brief moment of time between feeding 5000+ people and then walking on water and calming a storm. And the action didn't end there. When they had reached the other side, people recognized Jesus and "brought all who were sick to him, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak". That's part of the real work that Jesus was called to do. He was sent to heal and teach. Basically he was sent to live God's caring for the world.

We are called to be reflections of Jesus in this world. An important part of our work is to be caring people as Jesus was. To do this we need time to pause. We need commas in our lives. But this time is not the end in itself. This time is intended to prepare us for caring for the world around us.

I am so thankful that there are many ways that Messiah continues to operate as a caring community for the world around us. Continue to look to strengthen this caring. Continue to look for ways that you can participate personally in this caring, with the body of Christ here that we call Messiah.

I need a comma in my life at the moment. May this time energize me to participate with you in caring for the people of Camrose and people around the world. As we move into September, may we continue on in our journey together with Jesus' strength, wisdom and love.

Minister's Message



THE LORD YOUR GOD IS WITH YOU I am sitting on my front step and listening to the birds as I write this article. It is becoming more and more like fall outside. The days are just a bit cooler although very lovely still.

As we come to the end of August, we start to look at our normal fall schedules. I am struck by how everything is so up in the air right now. We will have schools opening that will look different. We will figure out how to meet in our church in small groups and in our assembly. Our Sunday School is figuring out how that might look during this time of pandemic. The warm weather still allows us to walk outside and meet together and yet we wonder," What will happen when winter hits us?" There are some real challenges in our days ahead, for sure; and, it can be a bit sad and discouraging for some.

And so, the road ahead of us is a little bit windy and kind of uncertain. We are truly unsure if we will start on a journey around one corner and find out that that road is blocked. We don't know if, when we begin meeting as a church, we will be able to continue. We just don't know.

It is in times like this that our faith in our Lord

comforts us. We are invited not to trust in the things of this world to lead us and guide us. Although we cannot count on things going always as planned, we can be sure of the One who leads us and guides us. Sometimes I have found it is even a little bit discouraging as we enter into fall this year. Maybe you have too. And yet in Joshua 1:9 we are given these words," Do not be afraid or discouraged for the Lord your God is with you wherever you may go." What solid words these are for us in these days where the ground beneath us is a bit uneven and the road before us more uncertain.

Our Lord is indeed with us wherever we may go. Let's take these words with us into the uncertainty of the days ahead and be reminded that God is indeed present in all our days, our moments and in all circumstances.

Meditation on Psalm 139 by Jane Arial

I want to preface the meditation with a message of gratitude to the members of Messiah Lutheran Church, my church family. You have supported myself and my family with prayer, visits, food, cards and a multitude of ways that have meant the world to us these last years. I know my love of scripture has been nourished by the foundation Messiah has laid for me. My life is filled daily with gratitude for you and your steadfast devotion to serving God.

One way I have been able to serve is through providing a space for Lectio Divina. We call it a journey through prayer. A group of us have been meeting for some years, weekly for one hour on Monday mornings. It is open to anyone who is called to deepen their awareness of how God is meeting them in their everyday lives.

The first time I was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia in July 2017, I was given the words of Psalm 91:2 by my friend who had cancer years ago. They helped her and they helped me. I walked the halls of the unit with "God is my refuge and my strength..."

So, backing up the story...something went awry in my bone marrow. Upon receiving reports of the blood results, it was determined that I would need a bone marrow biopsy. Leukemia was the diagnosis. With this, came one month at the U of A hospital following with three months of continued chemo.

Unfortunately, I had a relapse, diagnosed in January of 2019. The only way through this time was to have a stem cell transplant. Fortunately, my sister was a perfect match, thanks Carol!!! Thus, began the second journey, another month in the hospital followed by weeks of chemo and preparing for the stem cell transplant.

Through this second time, Psalm 139 was a go to for me. I sat one morning, just after the year anniversary, reading Psalm 139 again when a recent event in my life came to mind. What then followed was the following:

I have been knit in my Mother's womb and in fact reknit with new stem cells that are doing their work in my bone marrow. You have formed my inward parts God, and have provided the way for me to be new and fresh, like a newborn. Like a newborn baby, I need to have all my vaccinations done. One-year anniversary has come and gone. I have been able to return to most activities within reason. Such a relief not to be guite so cautious, living life fully. However, living life fully comes with bumps and bruises that I can't take for granted anymore. I was leading my grandson on a pull toy down our sidewalk. I turned to look at him and turning back, fell to my knees. I must have tripped, not sure on what! However, I was shaken and realized I had skinned my knee. I haven't skinned my knee since I was a little girl. The next day I had my "shots", including tetanus. The nurse asked if I had a recent injury. Does broken skin from a sidewalk count? Yes. God, you know when I rise and when I sit down (fall). God, you hem me in, behind and before and lay your hand upon me. Wonderful knowledge. The nurse needed special permission to give me immediate tetanus protection because I had broken skin. She needed to "call above" came to my mind as I sat, waiting for the word from the higher ups. I was able to receive the needed protection.

Living life, broken skin, loving care. How does God meet me where I am? I don't doubt God is with me, before and behind. One of the gifts of this time of illness, treatment and recovery is the gift of knowing the preciousness of moments, mostly simple daily events that give me a sustained knowing of God's love.

Bishop's Message For Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders



Dear Beloved of God -

There are written prayers which speak to me profoundly, and which I return to again and again. They have become part of me. My breath. My DNA.

"Come, Lord Jesus, be our guest", The Lord's Prayer, "Now I lay me

down to sleep", the familiar prayer from the Morning and Evening Prayer services, "O God, you have called your servants...", just to name a few.

I recall hearing this latter prayer years ago now, in the mid-80's as a college student, in the form of a choral anthem. The text, the prayer, had been set for fourpart harmony. A beautiful melody. Each vocal part wondrously written. I still sing the bass line and the melody.

Over the years I have sung this hymn, prayed this text, over and over again. As a new parent. When I began my First Call at Bethany Lutheran, Dickson, Alberta, and beginning each subsequent call. At the death of my youngest sister. At times when I have wondered and questioned. And, at times when I have moved to thanksgiving and praise.

One of the reasons that I love this prayer is because it is realistic and yet encouraging, honest yet hopeful. It doesn't deny difficult truths, but neither does it succumb to sterile pessimism. It was written in the first part of the twentieth century by a Church of England priest, Eric Milner-White, and like many good prayers from another time and place, it sounds like it was tailor made for us here and now.

Here and now, as the Spirit of God continues to lead us into a future that is unfamiliar, with the assurance that God is present, God's hand leading, cradled in love.

I have sung this prayer and prayed this text many times over these past COVID-19 months. I am sure that I will sing and pray them over and over again in the months to come.

As I have sung and prayed in these days of unseen endings, of paths yet untrodden, through perils unknown, I have experienced with you and through you so many signs of hope, of faithfulness, trust, courage, and encouragement.

Congregational leaders, lay and rostered who: under extraordinary stress, pressure and restraints have poured themselves into the work of leadership; and though tired and weary and wondering, have reached out to one another, and to those in their midst, providing pastoral care, connection, compassion and care.

Creativity, ingenuity, openness, support, encouragement, trust, community.

And our church, working together in ways that witness to the Spirit of God among us. Joint correspondence from national and synod treasurers, and from national and synod bishops. Sharing of resources and experience. A Pentecost celebration with our Full Communion partners.

As we journey together join me in singing the hymn. Join me in prayer.

And as we journey, continue to be humble and gentle with one another. Honor each other. Make space for lament. Welcome moments of joy. Help each other live into hope. Learn from this journey in the coronavirus wilderness and let the learning lead us forward. Trust that God is at work in this time and look for the new things God is doing even now.

Thank you for your witness to patient trust in God and to sacrificial, cruciform love for your neighbors.

The God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. Romans 15:13

News from the World Mission Scene

- 1. Thank you for your prayers on behalf of **Ryan and Siobhain Cole** who finally made it back to Papua New Guinea, he as Pilot with Mission Aviation Fellowship, she as support staff. Due to the pandemic, flights were not available across the Pacific so they had a route chosen Calgary, Montreal, Doha, Sydney, Papua New Guinea. After all flights were in place, on two occasions, at the last minute, the route became unusable because Australia had too many restrictions. Finally, they had a flight Doha to Kuala Lumpur in Malaysia. From there, a previously scheduled United Nations charter flight took them to Port Moresby, arriving there the week of 17 August. They then entered quarantine. They have extended their thankfulness to us at Messiah for our prayer support.
- 2. **Concerning George and Susan Watts and family:** Dr. Eric McLaughlin is a family medicine doctor at Kibuye Hope Hospital in Burundi, where he has served with his wife Dr. Rachel McLaughlin, an obstetrician, for the last seven years.

Eric's book, "Promises in the Dark: Walking With Those in Need Without Losing Heart," lays out Christian principles for facing overwhelming need. In February robbers attacked and nearly killed fellow missionary **George Watts**, who works as a hospital administrator. (George Watts is son of Messiah member, Cece Watts.)

Dr. McLaughlin's book is quoted:

Talk about 2020 in Burundi. It feels like the hardest period of time that we've known since we moved to Africa 10 years ago. It's not just the isolation; it's the multiple things that have hit us.

What happened to **George Watts?** On Feb. 22 armed robbers came into our housing area and went straight to the Watts' house. They stabbed and strangled George and tied up his family, looking for money. They didn't find the big haul they thought they were going to find and left. But they were just inches away from taking his life. Members of our team treated George. He needed IV fluids.

How did our team react? Kibuye has felt like a haven for us, so there is all the violation that comes with that. Multiple members of our team were traumatized. I can't remember a time where I've felt so relieved and grateful and full of grief all at the same time. Our home got violated and our teammate is in bad physical shape, and yet I'm so thankful he wasn't killed, that the gun they brought with them didn't go off. If x or y happened, things could have spun out of control. But what a ridiculous thing to say: out of control. Was the Lord in control of the situation or not? It happened one way; it didn't happen the other way.

How do you face all these difficulties? Psalm 77 stood out to me in some times of prayer surrounding the robbery. It's a classic psalm of lament. It says, "When I meditate, I groan," instead of "I find peace."

People rebel against helplessness, and there's an extent to which that's good.

What advice do you have for people in the West feeling helpless amid this pandemic?

The good news is we're not overwhelmed by being overwhelmed. We've lived through multiple malaria epidemics already. The world as a whole feels like it has entered into my world in Burundi, in terms of the amount of uncertainty.



What comes next? I have known more helplessness in my medical work than almost all other American healthcare providers. As a Christian physician who is often helpless to do what I would like to do, I have to trust that there is a bigger story about what is going on, that we're not alone in this fight, that God is present in His love and He's for us. And that we are not the end of the line when it comes to taking care of this world, or taking care of the person in front of us. Work as if it all depends on Go.

The **Watts family** is currently living in Edmonton where son Jonah will be starting at Kings University College in September. Whether the rest of the family will return to Kibuye is an open question at this time.

- 3. **Connie Landstrom** could not go to Tanzania last fall, but is still prepared to go when it is safe to do so. Connie has been participating in our Sunday services through YouTube.
- 4. **Rev. Brian Rude** has remained at his post in El Salvador during the pandemic. He watches Messiah's services via YouTube. Messiah's members' gifts toward this ministry through "In Mission with El Salvador" continue to be appreciated. Yellow envelopes to facilitate such gifts are available at the Church Office.
- 5. Messiah's gift in support of **Lutheran Schools in Colombia** has been forwarded to the Synod Office for relaying to Colombia. The amount was approximately \$1,200. This is the gift decided upon at the Annual Meeting in June.
- 6. The **World Mission Group** will resume its meetings on Monday, September 7 at 2:00 p.m. via ZOOM. You are welcome to contact Ray Blacklock if you would like to join in this meeting.





Sunday School Update

Sunday School classes will resume on September 27th with the following precautions:

- Students and parents will enter from the west entrance and after checking in will be seated in the open pews on the west side of the sanctuary.
- The children will remain with their parents until after the Children's Time. Rather than come to the front to hear the story, they will watch it on either the front or back screen.
- After they have heard the children's story, the children will follow their teachers down the west stair case to the Sunday School area.
- While in the large Sunday School assembly area the children will participate in large group activities. This might include viewing the video of the day's lesson, watching a puppet play and having a prepackaged snack. They will be seated physically distant from one another on carpet dots/spot-markers.
- After that the children will go to one of the three classroom areas. There will be a class for the preschool children, those in grades 1 and 2 and another for those in grades 3-6.
- Teachers as well as the children in grades 4-6 will wear a mask, which is their situation at school.
- After the service, the children will be met, by a parent or guardian, in the Sunday School area.
- An adult will distribute hand sanitizer both at the beginning and ending of Sunday School.
- The teachers will have access to a disinfectant spray such as a solution of 4 teaspoons of unscented household bleach to 4 cups of water that can be used on areas that are touched by the children.

The Nursery will be only for children age three and under and they must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. Toys and furnishings that cannot be safely used during COVID-19 will be removed from the Nursery and stored until it is safe for them to be used again.




