In-Person Worship Services


After our Church Council has met on December 16th you will be notified by the office regarding their decision.

Minister's Message



How long, O LORD? Will you forget me forever?

How long will you hide your face from me?

Psalm 13:1

I don't know what to talk about. Everything that I can think of to say feels like a broken record that keeps on repeating: covid19 is taking too long; there is so

much isolation; people are suffering; numbers of infected people are rising.

And still... time marches on.

We move into a new church year. We approach a new calendar year.

We want to look forward to Christmas, but so much of what we connect with Christmas is going to be strained – especially the gatherings of people. I know how much I have been ambivalent in the past about so many of the gatherings. I'm not so much a "party" person, and doing "small talk" at a gathering of people can be very exhausting for me. But, not being able to do these things at all is... well it's horrible. To think about not being able to gather as one big family group or as a caring congregation – it hurts my heart.

What we are experiencing could take years before it ends. Many, many times in history diseases have plagued people throughout the world. People have become sick; some died, some survived. Sometimes pandemics have lasted for years and have decimated regional populations. In spite of all of our technology and know-how, we are not immune from the ravages of new-to-us disease and infection. But it feels like we ought to be.



It feels like we should have more knowledge than our ancestors – we should be able to act more wisely than they did. It feels like we should be able to develop a vaccine quickly – and this may be true, but "quickly" may not be what we have come to expect in our "instant" world. In the meantime, steps *have* been taken to reduce the affects and the spread of this disease. But all, that so many have been doing, seems... insufficient.

Given history, there will be an end to covid19. Given history, humanity will move on. But that does not negate the current cost; it does not negate the suffering; it does not negate the loss of life (due directly or even indirectly because of this virus). We need to grieve. We need to lament. We need to see and feel and know hope. This hope, I believe, can be found only in God – in the person of Jesus.

Jesus embodies our hope. Through Jesus we are assured of abundant life that prevails in and through all the hardships we encounter. Through Jesus we know that there is, has been, and will be a bounty of goodness which overcomes all evil.

Come, Lord Jesus, come.

Amen.

Bishop's Message For Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders



Dear Beloved of God -

As a child I delighted in viewing CBC Hymn Sing on my grandparents black and white television screen with my identical twin and three younger siblings. I loved the arrangements of the

familiar hymns, as well as the physical arrangement of the choir. Often at night for many years my brother and I would sing the concluding Hymn Sing benediction before we closed our eyes.

I was enthralled as the Von Trapp family sang during the movie, The Sound of Music. My siblings and I would break out into our own musical renditions, often performing for family and friends

Together we sang for weddings and celebrations, with our mother at the piano. As children our song favorite was a version of a hymn sung now at all family funerals, "Children of the Heavenly Father," with a simple descant line that soared into the heavens.

And then I began to play for worship. My piano playing often in duet fashion with the organ. Soon my cousin I were leading singing during Sunday School openings.

My love for music continued post High School with piano as my second major. Accompanying college musicals and voice and instrumental majors, leading song from the piano during chapel services, playing for convocations and graduations.

And, playing for my own personal need. When I needed to step away, or forget, or rest, or vent, or weep.

These past months I have returned again and again to music as a spiritual practice.

Music has again become my prayer, for music is a spiritual practice that is life-giving for me - body, mind, and spirit - a spiritual practice that grounds me, refreshes me, and quietens me when I am inclined to go madly off in all directions. I am reminded of Luther's words that, "next to the Word of God, the art of music is the greatest treasure in the world."

Music, in these past months, has served as a reminder to me of what it is that I believe. Music and text seep into my bones in ways that didactic information never will. Music sinks under my skin shaping the very way I perceive this world - this uncertain time.

Music, in these past months, has been born anew in me for music, profound music, is born at times when there is no other possible way for something to be expressed. Here I am mindful of the words of Aldous Huxley, who in his magnificent essay titled, "The Rest is Silence," said: "After silence, that which comes nearest to expressing the inexpressible is music."

Music, in these past months, has connected my experience with that of the people of God of all times and places. The incredible and moving performances of individuals gathered around the world via technology to sing, to dance, to make music together.

The grandmother cradling and humming gently to the child who is afraid. Those gathered to grieve and mourn the death of a church leader from this vicious virus and hearing the trumpet proclaim God's presence and resurrection promise.

Cellist Yo-Yo Ma often shares the story of the first concert he played after September 11. In the face of that country's catastrophic loss, the orchestra members wondered: Do we play, or do we cancel? Together, they chose to continue with the performance as planned. Remembering that moment, he wrote, "Music will be the way that we will come together, because we're asserting ourselves as a community, as a people, as a city, as whatever. And we need to be together." Yes, together.

Music as spiritual practice. Life-giving music.

Recently I have learned a new hymn which continues to make its entry into my life. "God of the Movements and Martyrs." This hymn was written by David LaMotte on a commission from the North

Carolina Council of Churches in honor of their 85th Anniversary. It was arranged and recorded in six different styles by five different artists and premiered the week of June 15, 2020. Search the hymn title on YouTube. Please.

The lyrics form images which come repeatedly to my mind. The melody is simple and memorable. The cadences locate me in God. I am grounded, refreshed and quietened. The hymn is life-giving. It shapes my perception of the world even in this time. It expresses profoundly what is not easily, if at all, able to be expressed. It connects my experience with others, bringing us together.

Music as spiritual practice.

The God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. Romans 15:13

The Continuing Story of Lutheran Schools in Colombia

What does "CELCO" stand for?

Lutheran Schools in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia, South America

CELCO schools are private schools and require students to pay tuition. Public schools are paid for by the government. In the November *Messenger*, an article by Bishop Larry described the quality of these schools. Here is an extract from the November Messenger to remind us of why students go to these Lutheran schools:

"The students told us that they not only believed that they were receiving the best education possible which prepared them for post-secondary education, but that they also were receiving a well-rounded education where they learned values of love, respect, integrity, and character. They underscored the value of a Christian education where grace and faith were demonstrated."

There are 4 CELCO schools in Colombia, but here are details concerning one of those schools with the name CELCO Sogamoso which Bishop Larry and the other Alberta Synod members visited:

Bishop Larry continues: "In 1954 Pastor Gerhard Ostrem and Belva Nerlien were sent to Sogamoso to begin visiting the areas and analyzing options for work there. In 1955 the Colegio CELCO in Sogamoso was founded to serve the immediate area but also to serve children from the plains. Pastor Ostrem recognized that children in the plains were not getting an education as there were very few schools and those that were available continued to be a difficult environment for protestant children. When Colegio CELCO in Sogamoso opened it had a residence for children from the plains to live in while they went to school. Entire families from the plains also moved to Sogamoso in order for their children to attend school. Pastor Gerhard, along with Joyce Bergh and Pastor Arnfeld Morck* founded this school as an answer to the needs of the Lutheran and other Protestant families." *After retirement, Pastor Morck and his wife Hildur were members of Messiah in Camrose.

Many teachers who have taught in Sogamoso have an Alberta connection: for example: Joyce Bergh, and Pastor Jose Hernan and Carol Ariza.

There are now 500 students from preschool to grade 11 at CELCO Sogamoso. Pastor Benjamin Ojeda is the Director." Two pictures from Sogamoso help to show the flavour of the school:

Just a quick note to let you know that we have tickets, and our time in Canada is coming to an end. We leave Edmonton the morning of December 7 and will arrive in Bujumbura on December 9.

Between then and now we have a lot of bags to pack, good-byes to say, and many loose ends to wrap up.

Even though we have been here for months, there are so many people we didn't get to see, places we didn't get to, and events that never took place, and for that, we are saddened.

However, the last few months have been a time of great healing, resting, and recovery for our family, and for that, we are incredibly thankful.

We have been able to reconnect with family and friends, and this break away from our work in Africa has been incredibly helpful for us.

Clearly, we have mixed emotions about returning to our home in Kibuye - it is a place we love dearly but now has some very difficult memories associated with it.

Jonah will be returning with us, and continue his first-year of online university from home in Burundi, instead of staying here in Edmonton. The reality of this year has made moving to a new city and starting university so uniquely challenging; it seems a better fit for him to be at home in Kibuye and be able to be with our community there.

Also, our nephew Silas (who visited us with his family 2 years ago) will be returning with us to work as an intern on our team until the summer.

So we have lots of reasons to be thankful as we prepare to return.

Prayer requests:

- that we'd be able to get ourselves, our stuff, and our house ready for our departure
- for grace to deal with the toll that yet another round of goodbyes inevitably takes on us (and those we leave behind)
- that we would all stay healthy up to, and through our travels
- that our travels, including our connections between flights, would be safe and smooth.
- for peace as we return to Kibuye, our home, and our community

Thank you so much for all of you who have been praying for my mom (Cece Watts) who was very, very sick and hospitalized for all of October. She returned home a few days ago, her recovery nothing short of miraculous. Her healing is not only an answer to prayer and a huge relief to all who know her - but also made it possible for us to think about heading back to Burundi.



Council Highlights

With sadness, but in the hope of doing all possible to help reduce the impact of Covid-19, Council voted to suspend all Messiah-sponsored in-person group activities until December 13, 2020. This would not include office staff nor the worship team. Our pastors will still be able to bring communion to homes as long as health and safety protocols are followed.


Messiah is blessed with an active and enthusiastic Service Committee. However, since we seconded Chris to be congregation treasurer, that committee is without a Council representative. If you would like to be part of the Service mission of Messiah and serve on Council, please let one of the pastors or Charlene know. Service is a very important part of our mission. Please give it your consideration. p.s. Council is good too!

Messiah will apply for a recently announced Faith-based and Cultural Facility Relaunch Grant. The grant is to help with costs related to Covid-19.

There is good news and less good news on the financial front. Thank you everyone! Donations in October met budget. Thanksgiving offering was also strong and a bit above budget.

The less good news is that, six months into our year, we have an operating deficit which, at this rate, could well double by year end to approximately \$25,000. There are still reserves to cover such a deficit, but only for this year. This is not a sustainable situation. Council will meet in December to develop a plan and provide guidance to the budget committee.

Sunday School families, and I can also check with other knowledgeable people (our wonderful Messiah Lutheran Church staff) for ideas.



We have had a few interruptions in our work, as CLWR has discontinued the We Care program as we knew it.

A few ladies have finished tying the quilts, which were left after our quilting in the spring.

We contacted LAMP and they have arrived and picked up 20 Baby bundles and 20 quilts to take up to the North. The Open Door received 12 Hygiene kits plus a few CLWR bags. We received 100 bags in September and don't have any use for them yet.

On Eagle's Wings have been contacted, and they are not going North at this time. They would appreciate receiving money for their programs. I believe our MLW could send some funds to them.

We have contacted the Women's Shelter and the Hospice Society, and they will let us know if anything is needed. I've also left a message for a contact from the Victim Services Group, as they could probably use some quilts.

The Hope Mission needs smaller quilts (not Queen) which could be given as long as we could deliver them to Edmonton.

Our Circle meetings are still at a standstill, as Camrose has several cases of the virus. We will see what 2021 brings.

If you would like to donate to MLW, there is a basket at the front counter of Messiah Lutheran Church, clearly marked MLW offerings, next to the regular offering plate. You will receive a receipt in the New Year. Our ladies continue to distribute funds, to various local and other needy

places.




