

Minister's Message

"I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me."

John 10:14



I can see signs of life – spring is here. Now if only the weather would decide to be warm instead of jumping back and forth between warm, beautiful days and cold, windy days... This is the month that we expect to receive some new lambs. Signs are showing that this will be happening soon, it is exciting and also a little nervous – will we have enough space for all the new little ones? Will there be problems? Are we doing enough to ensure the health of our flock?

This Sunday (April 28th) we hear about Jesus as the Good Shepherd. Jesus knows the needs. Jesus meets the needs of his flock. Jesus' flock listens to him. These are wonderful things to know, but I think that Jesus also wants us to know that he is aware of the scary and dangerous things in our lives. The "wolf" does come much too often to snatch up and scatter us, the sheep. We do face all kinds of dangers – all kinds of things that come to do harm – and this is very real.

But Jesus is the good shepherd. Jesus does not run away. Instead, Jesus lays down his life for us, the sheep. I'm not so sure I really understand this all the way – "logic" tells me that the shepherd laying down his life may save the sheep today, but tomorrow the wolf will be hungry again and there will be no more shepherd to protect the sheep... This is where Jesus adds: "I lay down my life in order to take it up again". His death does not mean that he is no longer able to protect; his death is temporary but very much an integral part of the complete salvation of his sheep (us).

I don't think I will be called on to lay down my life for my 29 little sheep, but I will do my best to care for and protect them. Jesus goes *beyond* whatever I can: caring, protecting, laying down his life and taking it up to continue his loving presence for each and all of us... forever. This is gift. This is a wonder.



Jesus knows you.
Jesus cares about and for you.
Jesus does this in the best of times and in the very worst of times.

May you and I experience this truth in ways that vitalize our lives. Amen.

Minister's Message

LET YOUR RIVER FLOW OH LORD



Have you ever canoed down a river and found yourself caught in an eddy that you cannot easily get out of or stuck with something that has caught your boat in an undertow or in waters that were way too much for you to handle and your boat overturned? While on a canoe trip, years back, we travelled down a really rough spot in the river. Our personal canoe did not overturn (although many others did) but that was pretty rough water. The only thing that really worked for us was that there were two of us in the boat together riding the waves.

Life is like this. There are moments when one wonders if there might be an easier way down stream or in our case through life. I think it is especially the case these days while we ride the waves through Covid and struggle with all the safety issues connected to it. Sometimes we can feel pretty alone in it. Sometimes we don't even know how to navigate some of the waves. (literally we call them waves.) Sometimes it can seem like its more like a stagnant pool than a river with flow especially these days when the numbers of positive cases are going up.

But there are three really important things for us to remember on our river trip... First, we are not alone in our boats. We are joined together as people of God and we are doing this together.

Second, God is also in that boat with us.

Third, the Spirit of God is a part of the river and its flow.

The River of life that comes from the Spirit of our living God is never jammed up. She flows freely all the time. And she flows in God's timing. And she flows in love. Sometimes we don't know what or who to trust. But we can trust this because we can trust our God. And we do not need to rush this. We will make our way downstream.

I love the little quote from Pooh Bear that says.. "Rivers know this: There is no hurry. We shall get there some day." Winnie the Pooh.

Indeed, the Spirit of the living God knows full well where the journey in our life is taking us... we will get where we need to be even in these times.

I often equate the movement of the river to that of God's movement in our lives. The Spirit of God flows and carries us through life. We are always held in that river and the timing is always just right even though it can seem like it is way off and God has made some horrible mistake. (like the way things are in Covid times)

We can trust this river of God's love ever leading, ever guiding and ever holding us on this journey through life. We often try to

fight this flow. Sometimes we even try to paddle or swim upstream.

(I am especially good at this) But the Spirit of God is ever guiding this river and holding us as we move downstream.

In Psalm 46:4 we hear these words, "There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy habitation of the Most High."

As people of God we are promised in scripture that the water that we are given to by Jesus is water that becomes in us springs of living water. (John 4: 13-14) (continued)

Sometimes along these river trips we see springs of water coming out of the mountains. Here we can stop our little canoe for a drink of fresh water along the way. We are promised that the water and rivers of our souls are full of fresh water... that flow freely from the spirit of our Lord. This water flows within us and carries us through life's eddies and free flowing moments and all those in between.

We can trust our Lord and we can trust that God's Spirit will flow life in and through us and is gently flowing under us at all times.

Let the River of God's love flow in you in these days ahead. If you do, you will find that it's not blocked at all. Its just making its way because God's Spirit is ever and always at work within us.

There is an old song we sang at campfires. I think you all know it. Maybe you can sing it to yourself as you go about your days. It's a really encouraging little chorus.

I've got a river of life flowing out of me Makes the lame to walk and the blind to see, Opens prison doors, sets the captives free. I've got a river of life flowing out of me. Spring up, O well, within my soul. Spring up, O well, and make me whole Spring up, O well, and give to me That life abundantly

Bishop's Message For Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders



Dear Beloved of God -

The Synod of Alberta and the Territories will gather in convention in July under the theme, "On the Road," inspired by Luke 24:13–35. It is the post-Resurrection narrative of two people journeying from Jerusalem to Emmaus, where they are joined by a stranger who, when recognized, vanishes, and the two race back to Jerusalem.

Luke's narratives frequently take us on the road. More than half of the gospel takes place on or is related to a journey, and each time we know that something important is about to happen: Mary rushes to a Judean town in the hill country where she greets Elizabeth; a road leads Mary and Joseph from Nazareth to Bethlehem; a road is the narrative setting for the parable of the Good Samaritan; a road leads the prodigal back home to his father.

Jesus sets his eyes toward Jerusalem in Luke 9:51 and travels there until 19:28; this is known among scholars as the travel narrative where Jesus is on an extended journey.

The sequel to this gospel, The Acts of the Apostles, continues this theme: at Pentecost people journey to Jerusalem; on the road to Damascus, Saul is blinded and there is a significant change in his career, including his name; Philip meets the Ethiopian eunuch on a road.

There is something about travel that evokes Luke's literary and theological imagination. There is something about roads: the way they can bring us together; the way they can pose a danger to us all; the way they become a symbol of a faith on the move.

Luke's narrative take us on the road frequently, and we discover that whenever we start to journey with someone, we really do not know if we will end up where we thought the road was leading.

As the two travelers to Emmaus walk along, talking with each other about the momentous things that had happened, Jesus joins them. After they answer Jesus' questions, he speaks to them and interprets the scriptures for them, beginning with Moses and the prophets.

As they near their destination, Jesus walks ahead as if he is going further, but they convince him to stay with them, and at the table he takes bread, then blesses, breaks, and gives it to them. Their eyes are opened and they recognize him. Then Jesus vanishes.

But the narrative isn't finished. The journey isn't over. That same hour they get up and return to Jerusalem. The verb that the gospel writer uses here gets lost in translation. The word that we translate as "get up" is "anastantes" in the original Greek – the verb form of the noun that means resurrection. (continued)

This is a resurrection story. The two rise up and return to Jerusalem. They have been transformed, having passed through the shadow of death to new life.

And they return to Jerusalem, the place where the journey, the road, began. But they are not going back to their old normal. They have changed, and so has Jerusalem. Grief, sadness, and loss have been transformed: "The Lord has risen, indeed."

At a recent meeting of Synod Council, our Bible study leader suggested that this Lukan narrative, "The Road to Emmaus," has been incorrectly titled and that it should more accurately be named, "The Road to Jerusalem and Back, with a Pit Stop in Emmaus."

Emmaus was thought to be home, but it was not the destination. Emmaus was simply a pit stop on the road. We thought the destination was somewhere else, but we are back in Jerusalem. Back where grief has taken place, back into the hot seat. Back to the sadness, the loss, where hope once resided.

Back ... and transformed.

Where is the road taking us today? To our homes? Or to a pit stop?

We do not know the future, but we have what we need. Jesus is feeding us. We have the Scriptures. We have each other. We know that we will not get to where we are going without going together. Jesus is with us.

We look forward to going ahead at last with a Confirmation service in June for those who would normally have completed their program and been confirmed in 2020. Pastor Bev has continued to meet with the group on occasion throughout the past year to keep them connected.

A big thank you goes out to the generous and gifted volunteers on the Worship Team for their contributions to our on-line services.

We were excited to hear more from Pastor Bev about the discernment process being planned for over the coming year. Everyone will have the opportunity to engage in a process designed to help us listen together for God's guidance - for how God wants to work through us in the future. As Pastor Bev noted, this is a process that requires commitment, patience, prayer, deep listening, and letting go of our attachment to our own preconceived outcomes. Much more information will be coming in the weeks ahead. Meanwhile, it is not too soon to begin to pray and to open ourselves to the leading of the Holy Spirit through this process.

Ministering on-line has been challenging, but it has also opened new channels of learning and connection. One thing that has become clear is that people who have participated in the various Zoom-based studies, Lenten studies and Alpha want more! Recognizing this need for ongoing learning and community, Pastor Bev and Donny Loewen are looking into new opportunities.

Thank you to the members of the Budget Task Force who will be meeting over the next few months to review and make recommendations regarding Messiah's budget.

As we were reminded in the opening devotion, we need to wholeheartedly seek God's wisdom at all times. How is God working through us now in spite of all that seems to have gone awry?

Treasurer's Update

In my last messenger article from November, 2020, I described to you the financial situation our church has been in, not just this year, but for the last four or five years. Most of my monthly short updates in the Messenger since that time have continued to show the same trend: expenses which are higher than donations and income received. It appears certain that MLC will again be in deficit position at the end of April, our budget year end.

Clearly, we cannot continue to operate the church this way.

Our Church Council has struggled with this problem. Some of the answers seem good, but might be hard to implement or the outcome would not be certain. Other answers lead to making some difficult changes to reduce our spending.

Three main actions (or activities) are now occurring to address this issue:

- 1. A new budget for the upcoming 2021-2022 year has been drafted for approval at the next General Congregational meeting in June. This will be a "deficit budget". It means that the Council is trying to present a realistic picture of what our finances will look like if we continue doing things as we have in the past.
- 2. A small group of MLC members has been asked to review various options the Executive & the Council have come up with, see if there are other options, and make recommendations to the Council before September 13, 2021. We ask that you prayerfully support this group as they deliberate, and prayerfully consider what you think is best for the congregation.
- 3. A larger, more long-term, discernment process has been started. Pastor Bev indicates that discernment is the process of listening for the guidance of God in our midst. The details of this process will evolve over the next few months, and the process itself will occur over the next year. Please watch for more details and be ready to get actively involved.

Philippians 4:6 comes to mind sometimes these days, and when it does not come to

mind, is probably when its advice needs to be followed again.

Regular offerings for the month of March were very close to budget, about \$31,000. Easter special donations started to come in March, but we will not know the total until after publishing of the Messenger. Our year-to-date deficit in total donations and revenue is now \$24,600. Expenses are \$8,000 lower than budget for the 11 months, for an net deficit of \$17,800.

Another Note From the Treasurer

Hi Everyone! I wanted to take a moment and tell you about a little project I have started. Over the last few months the Church Council has been trying to find ways to improve the church's financial position. A big part of this process is to keep you informed each month as to the increasing deficit we have.

Another part of that process is to make sure that the spending each committee does is well thought through and carefully tracked. Each Committee develops a budget around this time of year, which should then be followed in the forthcoming year. Receipts for costs incurred by committees get brought to the office where they are paid and recorded so that monthly financial reports can be created. And the financial reports, of course, help us understand the sources income and how it is spent.

How can you help? If you have made a purchase on behalf of the church, please make sure that the committee chair responsible for the spending receives the documents (receipts probably). Committee chairs need to approve the expenses of their committee and do this by completing an Expense Approval Form, which then goes to the office with the other documents. By the way, there is an Expense Approval Form currently being used and available at the church office: we are looking into ways to improve it.

A significant goal of this process is that by the time Expense Approval Form and supporting documents get to the church office for payment, our bookkeeper should have all of the information needed to quickly make the payment. Another goal is to ensure that the committees have a clear understanding of the spending they are doing. A third goal is that the church council executive will be able to see the approval form with supporting documents and be able to sign off on the payment, confident that expenditures have been carefully thought through.

The preceding paragraphs have indicated the who, what, where, when and why of the process. The main thing I hope you get out of this article is to please make sure that if you make an expenditure on behalf of the church, take it (or have it delivered) to the appropriate committee so that it can be properly accounted for.

In-Person Worship Resumes at Messiah on May 16, 2021

Messiah's Church Council met on April 21 and approved the Worship Committee's recommendation that the option to attend in-person worship resume on May 16, 2021.

We are fortunate to gather as a faith community through the broadcasting of our services on Eastlink Cable TV and through the live streaming of them on YouTube. Although we encourage you to continue worshipping virtually, if that is what best meets your needs, some people have been anxious for the option of worshipping together, in person.



To help ensure that our worshippers are as safe as possible we will follow the same guidelines that were implemented last the Fall. They include the following:

- Register your intent to attend by phoning or emailing the church. Please do this each time you plan
 to attend as we are currently limited to 15% of our fire code occupancy.
 That translates into 70 participants.
- Initially, we will only enter through the link doors and exit out the main door in the Narthex. This will be reviewed as attendance increases (refer to map on page 12).
- Arrive in plenty of time to be seated.
- Please use the hand sanitizer which will be at the entrance.
- Worshippers are required to wear a mask. Masks will be available at the entrance but you are welcome to wear your own.



- When arriving and leaving the church, please keep 2 metres apart from attendees that are not members of your household. Only every other pew will be used so an usher will lead you to a safe place to sit. At the end of the service an usher will guide dismissal beginning with the back pews on the west side.
- Upon entry into the sanctuary, offerings can be placed in an offering plate. Other options for giving include mailing in a cheque, completing an E-transfer (offering@messiahcamrose.ca), dropping off your donation at the office or arranging for automatic withdrawals through your bank.

- Our worship team will provide music, but we ask that you not join in by singing aloud. Instead, we
 invite you to sing in your head, hum along, or meditate on the music. Hymnals will not be used.
 Worship folders will be distributed by the ushers.
- Share the "Peace of the Lord" by waving, nodding or bowing rather than with physical contact such as shaking hands, hugging or bumping elbows.
- The washrooms in the hallway to the Fellowship Centre will be open as will the one at the back of the sanctuary.
- Sunday School is scheduled to resume in September of 2021. Until then, children who are in attendance at worship are to asked to remain, at all times, with their parent or guardian.

Further safety guidelines that are outlined by Alberta Health include the following:

- Anyone with symptoms of COVID-19; with a history of international travel in the last 24 days; or with close contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19 in the past 14 days must remain at home.
- Do not attend if you are experiencing the most common symptoms of COVID-19 (cough, fever, shortness of breath, runny nose, or sore throat).
- If you are unsure about your health you are encouraged to use the online self-screening tool. Search for "COVID-19 Self Assessment for Albertans".
- Those with underlying medical conditions and those over 65 years old should be aware that they are at higher risk of experiencing worse symptoms if they contract the virus.

Whether worshipping in-person or virtually from home

we gather as one in the Spirit to worship and praise our Lord.



CLWR's 75th Anniversary

CLWR was founded on March 14, 1946. Its "principal purpose was to address the urgent need to supply material relief to the occupied zones of Germany and Austria." CLWR had great success in collecting food and clothing and in raising funds. By May 28, 1947, CLWR had made possible the shipment of 142,403 pounds of used clothing to war-ravaged Europe.

However, as early as 1947, CLWR realized that aid was not a long-term solution and that efforts should be directed toward resettling ethnic Germans in Canada. CLWR joined with several other faith-based agencies to form the Canadian Christian Council for Resettlement of Refugees (CCCRR). By the time CCCRR operations ended in 1961, the organization had facilitated the immigration of an astounding 41,000 refugees to Canada.

One vital component of this success was the steamship, MS Beaverbrae, which



was received by Canada as a war compensation and then was turned over to the CCCRR for its transportation use. It completed 52 voyages, carrying a total of 33,259 passengers. Every time the Beaverbrae returned to Europe, it would be full of CCCRR's material aid and relief supplies. Besides bringing the immigrants to Canada, CLWR had an excellent record of finding placement work.

Some of the immigrants received a small loan from CLWR to help in resettlement. One such person was a man named Daniel Schickedanz who arrived in Canada aboard the Beaverbrae. In 1950, Daniel worked hard to pay back his \$265 loan within nine months of arriving in Canada. In 2020, to celebrate 70 years of living in Canada, he paid it forward by making a generous, \$1 million donation to the same organization that helped him discover his new home all those years ago.


If you don't have the skills listed, really the main thing we need is someone with a strong desire to learn and serve. We will provide training.

April 24, 2021 Area Gathering Summary

On Saturday, April 24 people gathered from our Northern, West-Central and East-Central areas on Zoom. This was an opportunity to see one another from different congregations and to recognize that we are not alone as congregations but have many others who are struggling with similar issues and rejoicing over similar successes.

We began with a welcome and a brief time of worship lead by Bishop Larry. We then moved into a recorded presentation by author Susan Beaumont specifically for our Area Gatherings. Susan has written a book titled "How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You are Going" and her presentation focused on the content in this book and how it relates to our current state of the pandemic. Much of what we are experiencing is new and we don't know what "normal" will look like when the pandemic is over.

Susan talked about this time we are in as being "liminal" time – which is a time "inbetween" – from a place that we have known, in a place where we are not sure where we are right now, into something that we very much do not know what it will look like. Our scriptures note many such times for the people of God: Noah, Abraham/Sarah, Joseph, the wilderness wandering, Jonah, Jesus (wilderness), Paul and Peter to name a few. Another example of a "liminal" time/space is an airport – that time between where



we were to where we are going – though often we know where we are going... One more suggestion that Susan made follows the thinking of others where our own Church has been through other liminal times. It seems that about every 500 years the Church has seen major shifts between what was and what would be: Church beginnings at Pentecost; movement into the primary religion of the Roman Empire; split between the East and West; Reformation; and now... We have been seeing evidence of a shift in our decreasing attendance and falling numbers, especially in the last 30 or so years.

In this liminal time there are some important pieces that we need to attend to and realize and that takes a lot of work. First, this is not "change management". We don't know where we are going or how long this will take. As a result, we need to try to listen to God – and many of us are not sure on how to do that listening (we are unsure or suspicious of "revelation" that does not come completely from logic and measurement). Second, liminal time is often time of mixed emotions; Susan noted Ezra 3 where there was both praise and weeping over the foundations of the new temple.

In a liminal time there are opportunities that abound. There is the possibility for increased creativity. There is the opportunity for deepened and enlivened community. Often power structures are at least partially dismantled and decisions begin to be made in a more egalitarian way with more people having valuable input for the benefit of everyone. There is the necessity to rediscover what our core identity and purpose is. There is opportunity to shed what no longer fits.

While there are opportunities, there are also threats. Often people feel anxious in a liminal time and may begin to react in unhealthy ways. There will also be a degree of denial that change is happening or needed and some (many?) may actively resist any change. Another threat is the appearance of "tricksters". These are people (or ideas) that can be quite charismatic but incapable of living well in community. Tricksters often love chaos and do their utmost to maintain imbalance in a community.

It is not easy (to say the least) to determine what is a threat and what is an opportunity!

In a time of liminality it is important for leadership to lead with "presence". Traditionally leadership focuses on direction, protection and order (orienting people in roles, dealing with conflict, and maintaining the norms of an organization). But, in a liminal time these types of focus can be counter productive if not harmful. Instead, leadership needs to encourage people to move from thinking they know to realizing they don't know. Also, to help people move from striving to keep things the same to yielding to the situation (while not giving up). Leadership needs to encourage attending to what is coming to be instead of trying to maintain what has "proven" to work in the past. Leadership needs to be grounded in wonder and openness to the leading of God.

All of these things are important at any time, but often in good times the need for such positions diminishes in favor of a need to manage the good, busy, "successful" times. There is more to what Susan is suggesting but you will need to pick up the book to check it out.

The presentation was followed by breakout sessions where people of the various Areas were gathered together for discussion on the presentation and how it might apply within our Area. In our Area, we recognized much of what Susan was talking about in our own situations. It was good to be "together" at least in this way to see and hear what others in our geographic area are experiencing, feeling and doing in these times. (continued)

After the breakout, the Bishop spoke about the state of the synod as a whole and about what he has been hearing about from congregations in general. He began by thanking us for the care we show for each other in times like these. He showed a video of Rowan Atkinson (Mr. Bean) singing from Beethoven's 9th Symphony – the words were simply no longer there for him and he needed to improvise. Many of us are feeling similarly in our situations.

Questions raised by Bishop Larry: Where is God in our neighborhood and world? What will we need in the coming months? What kinds of things will we need to give up? Bishop Larry also encouraged us by suggesting that we may discover (or already have discovered) that we have more capacity that we were aware of for working collaboratively. He gave some examples from the Synod in the past year.

There is much opportunity in these times. Our society is reeling from many things: polarization, xenophobia, inadequate support for the most vulnerable and so on. The opportunity is that we have God with us and a way to speak about and share this with others that is lifegiving, life changing and healthy. We may be in a time of rediscovering our "core".

We listed together some of the biblical narratives that speak to this time. Psalm 137, 2 Corinthians, Nehemiah, Noah, Sabbath rest, road to Emmaus, Psalm 23, 40 year wilderness, Elijah/Elisha, Saul to Paul, Esther and others.

Some "stats". We've progressively moved over the last few years from 108 rostered leaders in 2009 to 63 rostered leaders in 2021 - 73% of which are in the 51-70 age range. Congregations are diminishing and needed to do things differently from before. It can be alarming.

Another suggested reading is a small book entitled "Becoming a Hybrid Church". This touches on possible changes in all areas of congregational life. If you are interested in reading this, please contact Pastor Calvin.


