Minister's Message

AS OUR LIVES UNFOLD



We have had quite a lovely summer full of warm days to enjoy. I for one have really loved the beautiful weather this summer. And as fall opens it seems to be continuing. We have been met this summer not only with sunshine and warmth but also

with sadness and tears as life has taken turns that have broken our hearts as a church community. We continue to travel together in these painful moments also. We are missing precious loved ones in our midst as we gather this fall.

We have experienced sudden and unexpected deaths, funerals and sudden painful losses, weddings and celebrations, a baptism, graveside moments and a confirmation. All of these are such important parts of our lives: birth, baptism, confirmation, marriage, death. There is a hymn that comes to my mind and speaks to God's presence in all our moments. It begins with these words, "I was there to hear your borning cry. I'll be there when you are old. I rejoiced the day you were baptized... to see your life unfold." I love the words to this hymn. It speaks to God's presence from the moment we take our first breath...and as every moment unfolds. It concludes with the words... that remind us that even as we take our last breath God is still there to meet us with another surprise.

Life is not very predictable... it unfolds and we are not in control of most of what happens. Sometimes it is full of joyful moments and other times full of pain and struggle... and then as it unfolds we discover God in each and every unfolding moment. We can trust our Lord to be there for all that takes place in our lives.

As people of God it is such comfort to remember this presence ever there no matter what life brings. Some mornings we

wake up thinking it will be a regular day and suddenly find ourselves thrown into unexpected trauma or deep pain that changes our lives forever. Life brings what it brings and sometimes it really hard. Other times its full of beauty and joy. As our lives unfold, we can know this gentle presence with us... there is never a moment that our Lord is not holding us, never a moment we are not loved... never a moment where our God leaves us... We are always met with the presence of the Spirit of the living God. Psalm 139 speaks to this never ending presence...

Psalm 139:1-18

- 1 You have searched me, Lord, and you know me.
- 2 You know when I sit and when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar.
- 3 You discern my going out and my lying down;
 - you are familiar with all my ways.
- 4 Before a word is on my tongue you, Lord, know it completely.
- 5 You hem me in behind and before, and you lay your hand upon me.
- 6 Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, too lofty for me to attain.
- 7 Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence?
- 8 If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there.
- 9 If I rise on the wings of the dawn,
- if I settle on the far side of the sea, 10 even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast.
- 11 If I say, "Surely the darkness will hide me and night wraps itself around me,"
- 12 even the darkness is not dark to you; the night is as bright as the day, for darkness is as light to you.
- 13 For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb.
- 14 I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made.
- 15 My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of

the earth.

16 Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book

before one of them came to be.

17 How precious to me are your thoughts, God! How vast is the sum of them!

18 Were I to count them,

they would outnumber the grains of sand—when I awake, I am still with you.

Wonderful are your works;

that I know very well.

Whatever it is that you are living today and however your life is unfolding, remember God is there...forgiving you... holding you... loving you... healing you and ever and always with you.

What a comfort to know as we enter into the fall season that God joins us as a people of God in all that is and all that will be.

No matter what life holds, we are met with the presence of our Lord.

Gathered as one in the Spirit, we also journey together as our moments unfold. We are never alone. For this I am very grateful!

Let us remember that we can trust our Lord to be present and to guide us as we move into each unfolding moment of our days.

This year's theme, "Listen to the Voice of Creation," is an invitation to remember God's call and to pay attention to those being silenced in the public discourse on climate change and on the ethics of Earth conservation, such as:

- the voices of those drawing attention to the ethics of earth-keeping;
- the voices of those who suffer the most impacts from climate change;
- the voices of those who possess ancestral wisdom about living with gratitude within the limits of Earth; and
- the voices of those pointing out plants and animals which are drastically declining in numbers and in diversity.

An additional resource is being prepared by our Synod's Care of Creation Ministry Team. In collaboration with confirmands from across the

Synod, a set of brief videos, based on this year's "Season of Creation" theme, is being prepared and will be shared through our Synod Office and available on our Synod's website: www.albertasynod.ca.

I encourage you to share these videos with your congregation in your weekly/monthly newsletter, through social media pages and/or as a prelude/ postlude to your worship services between September 1 and October 4. I hope that you will share these brief videos of awe, lament and hope for the future of creation seen through the eyes of our youth.

As followers of Christ from around the globe, we share a common call to care for creation. We are co-creatures, and part of all that God has made. Our wellbeing is interwoven with the wellbeing of the Earth. We rejoice in this opportunity to safeguard our common home and all beings who share it.

We listen and raise our voices in prayer this Fall. We act on behalf of this world that God loves. We listen to the voice of Creation.

SYNOD FINANCIAL APPEAL Lakeland Lutheran Church




The exterior appears relatively undamaged; it is only as you enter the church, that you see the extensive damage caused by a suspicious fire in the early hours of July 2, 2022, at Lakeland Lutheran Church (Cold Lake AB).

Though thankful that no one was injured in the blaze or fighting the fire, the congregation and Pastor AnnE Zimmerman continue to deal with the aftermath: cleanup, investigation, insurance claims, hurt and "church homelessness". They greatly appreciate the many calls and emails, and the recent visit from Bishop Larry (July 14), wide-spread prayer support, and the immediate support of the

Cold Lake faith community. The structural integrity of the building remains undamaged, but the sanctuary (site of the fire) and main floor of the building are presently being stripped of what was destroyed or damaged—flooring, drywall, pulpit, etc. Amazingly, the baptismal font, the altar, and the Christ candle and stand were undamaged and, following cleaning, will be among the few items saved from the sanctuary.





Pastor AnnE, on July 2, wrote to her congregation, reminding them that "A church building is precious in a faith community. Yet...the church truly is the people....be reminded that in surprise, shock, and upsetting concern – God is ever present holding us and others within Cold Lake who may have seen the damage occurring. We pray for those who did this as well"

EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH IN CANADA

Please continue to remember in prayer members and friends of the congregation, Pastor AnnE, and the workers who labour to clean and repair the damaged portion of the church and other areas affected by smoke and water. The congregation has been welcomed with open arms by St. John the Evangelist Anglican Church who immediately offered worship space. It is anticipated that the Lakeland building will not be usable for some time.

If you are interested in helping Lakeland financially, funds will be welcomed for incidental items not covered by insurance. Immediate needs include worship resources such as pew editions of *EvLW* (app. \$35 per copy) and *All Creation Sings* (app. \$21 per copy), Accompaniment Editions of both worship resources, as well as other music and supplies for worship. Initial funds received will be used to cover the cost of such items which will be furnished with a bookplate stating the names of individuals or congregations responsible for funding their purchase. Additional funds will be used as the congregation deems necessary.

Funds may be remitted through your congregation or directly to the Synod office (10014 – 81 Ave NW Edmonton AB T6E 1W8); please clearly mark them for Lakeland Lutheran. Cheques sent directly to office must be endorsed to "Alberta Synod, ELCIC". Gifts may also be designated for this project through Canada Helps on our Synod website; be aware that a processing fee is taken from the funds

donated in this way.

Reflections on the July 15-16 2022 Online ELCIC National Convention Submitted by Darlene Dahle Lay Delegate, East Central Area, Synod of Alberta and The Territories

Perhaps you were able to read some of the Convention Highlights that were in an ELCIC email that Lori Mokry forwarded to you on July 20th. In this submission to the *September Messenger* I will share my own reflections on the Convention.

Since this was an online convention, a certain amount of computer skills was required. Over the past two years I have used ZOOM many times so I thought this would be easy. Well, it wasn't! First of all, I hadn't upgraded to the latest version of ZOOM as I was told to do, and secondly, I needed assistance from the technicians so I could switch back and forth from viewing the main stage to seeing the voting platform. Consequently, my computer skills have been upgraded!

The Convention was very well organized and the voting procedure was very clear. In May a Bulletin of Reports was made available to us and although we were encouraged to save paper by reading it online, Lori graciously printed the huge document for me and assembled it into a two-inch binder. I couldn't have done without it! Thanks Lori! I needed the Bulletin of Reports for this year's convention but it also contains many reports that will be on next year's agenda when the ELCIC Convention reconvenes, hopefully in-person, and with the Anglican Church of Canada. The date and venue for that convention are yet to be announced. I will continue to be a delegate.

There were one hundred forty-one registered delegates at the Convention. Twenty-seven delegates represented the Areas of our Synod. Three pastors and three lay delegates (one under the age of thirty) were from our East Central Area. This is the first convention where a goal was set to have 20% participation of delegates in the age range of 16-30.

I was on the Committee of Reference and Counsel with two other lay and two rostered delegates. This Committee was responsible for making recommendations on petitions/resolutions that were presented to them during the convention. Interestingly, the only motion submitted came from a group of eight delegates who represented the under 30 age category. They wanted organizers of future conventions to give their "best effort" in arranging dates that fall over a weekend. The Committee considered that a reasonable motion so it was presented to the delegates and passed.

I was most interested in understanding what was meant by the convention theme: Let There be Greening. Quoting from Bishop Susan: Greening is all about new life. We want our church and all of our members to be greening, full of the spirit and of the new life in Christ. We want our world to be greening, with an end to war in Ukraine, Yemen, Syria, Afghanistan and elsewhere, and a chance for new life to re-emerge. We want creation to be greening, restored to the freshness and health the way God created it.

The Bulletin of Reports outlines the ELCIC National Church Strategic Plan for 2022-2025. This

includes the Mission Statement, Vision Statement, and Areas of Focus. The Mission Statement is as follows:

The mission of the church, as an expression of the universal Church and as an instrument of the Holy Spirit, is to share the gospel of Jesus Christ with people in Canada and around the world through proclamation of the Word, celebration of the sacraments, and through service in Christ's name.

The ELCIC Vision Statement is this: God's grace and unconditional love calls us to be a diverse, inclusive community that celebrates all and upholds life giving relationships.

As a National Church, we are called to focus on

- ... striving to be a Healthier Church (Hebrews 10:24-25...and let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, but encouraging one another and all the more as you see the Day approaching.)
- ...seeking to cultivate Effective Partnerships (I Corinthians 3:9 For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building)
- . . .encouraging Relational Leadership (Ephesians 4:12 To equip the saints for the work of ministry for building up the body of Christ.)
- ... leading with Compassionate Justice (Isaiah 1:17 Learn to do good, seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow.)

Elections were held for the five members of the Court of Appeal (three lay and two rostered) and for the eleven members of the National Church Council (one lay and one rostered from each of the four western synods and two lay and one rostered from the eastern synod). Biographies for all the candidates were given in the Bulletin of Reports.

For the Court of Appeal, one of the three elected lay candidate is from AB (Brent Latimer, Faith Lutheran Church, Calgary) and the other two are from the MNO Synod. One rostered member on

the Court of Appeal is Rev Trish Schmermund, Holy Spirit Lutheran Church, Edmonton; the other one is from the Eastern synod.

Elected representatives on the NCC from our synod are Kathleen Jensen, a lay delegate from Brooks, and Rev Kevin Powell, First Lutheran Church, Calgary.

Electing a new vice-chair was an interesting process. For the first vote a delegate could nominate anyone they wanted. The candidate I had mind did not give me permission to nominate him so I did not vote on the first ballet. However, about 66 people were nominated! After the second ballet, the five nominees who had the most votes were left on for the third ballot. Each of those five candidates was invited to



submit a bio. before Friday's vote. Only Bruce Cook from Ontario submitted one so he easily won on the third ballet.

In 2011 the ELCIC made the following commitment:

This church upholds the dignity of all people. We recognize the image of Christ in every person and serve that person as Christ himself. In meeting diverse people, we begin with a core sense of respect for the value of each person as a unique child of God.

At that time a new sexuality statement permitting clergy in committed same-gender partnerships and allowing the blessing of same-sex unions was also adopted. (This followed the 2005 legalization of same sex marriages in Canada.) Although congregations were encouraged to follow the decision regarding the calling of a pastor in a committed same-gender partnership or allowing the blessing of same-sex unions, it was left up to individual congregations as to whether or not to adopt this policy. Messiah chose not to.

ELCIC's 2011 commitment and statement on sexuality were similar to those made by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in 2009. Their policy allowed for LGBTQ+ marriage and ordination of LGBTQ+ clergy and stated that LGBTQ+ individuals were welcome and encouraged to become members and to participate in the life of the congregation.

Then at the National ELCIC Convention in 2019, the above 2011 ELCIC commitment to "Uphold Dignity" was affirmed. However, eleven years later, Bishop Susan recognized that our ELCIC churches have not lived up to our commitment so, during her report to the delegates, she apologized to the 2SLGBTQIA+ community.

Today I apologize to the members of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community for the ways that we have not lived up to our commitment and to the ways we have treated you in the past and even now.

With this apology I acknowledge the harms we as a church have caused and those harms we continue to cause. We have work to do and I cling to a hope that the entire church will learn from the past and work toward a future where all generations will feel acceptance, affirmation, and celebration for the gifts they bring our church as valued children of God.

Beginning August 1,2022, Carmen Ramirez joined the ELCIC National Office in the newly created role of assistant to the bishop for diversity, equity and inclusion.

Devotional times during the convention were based on Psalm 104 which is a hymn of praise that follows the order for creation similar to Genesis 1. The emphasis was on caring for God's creation. One of the devotional leaders was Rev. Dr. Lyle McKenzie, former Chaplain at Augustana.

The National Church Council (NCC) presented its report via five video presentations. It is the business arm of the church. The NCC was responsible for passing 97 motions which are in the Bulletin of Reports and approving the new vision statement and adopting the strategic plan, both of which were mentioned earlier in this report. The NCC also appointed task forces on addressing Ableism; addressing Racism, White Supremacy. and issues of Racial Injustice; addressing Homophobia, Biphobia, and Transphobia; and on addressing Carbon Neutrality. These reports are in the Bulletin of Reports and will be the topic of discussions in 2023.

The presentation by Rev. Dr. Karin Achtelsletter, executive director of Canadian Lutheran World Relief, was impressive. I didn't realize that in 2021 CLWR celebrated its 75-year anniversary of operation! CLWR was one of the sponsors for the convention and Pastor Karin mentioned how grateful she was for the ELCIC's partnership in mission. I'm happy members of Messiah are encouraged to support CLWR. Thanks to Marilyn Hoveland, Messiah members are kept up to date on CLWR.



Another presentation was on the governance reforms sought by the Lutheran Collegiate Bible Institute (LCBI) also referred to as LCBI High School, in Outlook Saskatchewan. Although mostly favorable, this report generated more discussion than any other at the convention.

LCBI corporate meetings have traditionally been held during ELCIC Conventions when the delegates have had voting privileges. However now that the number of delegates has been reduced and are only meeting every three years, it has been necessary for LCBI to make some constitutional and bylaw changes. It is hoped that the reforms will. . .

- enable a more flexible and responsive framework;
- allow the school to fulfil its founders' educational, ecumenical and ministry aspirations more effectively;
- nourish new growth within our school community while remaining loyal to the vibrant vision of the founders and our church;
- strengthen the relationship between the corporation and the school;
- retain ties to the ELCIC through a common statement of faith and involvement of ELCIC congregations while also allowing for more ecumenical support;
- improve our connections with alumni and the membership; and
- increase our ability to recruit new members.

LCBI's bylaw and constitutional changes will now be submitted to the Province of Saskatchewan for approval.

The anticipated enrollment at LCBI this Fall is between 90 and 100 students.

Luther College in Regina, which made constitutional changes in 2018, and LCBI in Outlook, which is making changes now, will both be invited to give "good news" reports at future ELCIC Conventions.

Bishop Susan Johnson noted that the current membership of the ELCIC is about half of what it was in I986, when the ELCIC was formed. However, she emphasized our growing of partners, namely the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), the American Episcopal Church, the Anglican Church of Canada, Canadian Lutheran World Relief, World Council of Churches, Canadian Council of Churches, Lutheran World Federation, ELC in Jordan and soon, the Moravian Church in North America.

NORTHERN UGANDA

There are many women and children who have fled the conflict in South Sudan and have settled in a refugee settlement in Northern Uganda. They are reeling from the violence they have endured. They are strong and resilient, but they need a community of support around them to recover from years of violence and emotional trauma.

A woman named Irene, who regularly visits a **Safe Space** in Northern Uganda shares this message.

"I don't feel alone anymore. My life was thrown into chaos when I was forced to flee South Sudan. I lost everything – my belongings – my business – my pride! So many emotions! I felt alone until my friend told me about the mental health programs at the Women and Girls Safe



Space – it was my first glimmer of hope that maybe everything would be okay. The Safe Space is a place where I can talk freely without judgement. I feel safe with others that understand how hard it is to be separated from loved ones and feel like you're never going to see them again. I am healing ... through shared experiences of fear, hope and loss with other women. I am also making money for myself through opportunities provided at the Centre – I joined the hairdressing group and I've started braiding hair for money. This project is helping me to heal emotionally and create a new future that will provide for myself and my children. While I'm not yet fully whole again... I will be."

This is the impact our gifts can have. \$29.14 will provide counselling and skills training for 10 women or girls, or \$145.71 for 50 women or girls.



Treasurer's Report - August 2022

We now have financial statements for the first three months of our fiscal year.

It is exciting to see the strong support for the Camrose Refugee Centre special appeal for support of the relocation of Ukrainians to our community. Total donations for the three month period were over \$60,000. Much of this came from community members, but it is all recorded at Messiah as we are hosts of the Refugee Centre.

At the same time it is worrisome to see that general offerings for the first three months of our year (from envelopes, plate, and other undesignated offerings) were down from \$80,897 last year to \$73,750 this year. This is a decrease of 8.8%. For the three months the financial statements show a deficit of \$8,039.

The call process is moving ahead based on the decisions made at the annual congregational meeting. We all look forward to the arrival of a second pastor. One half of a pastor's compensation will be shared by the congregations at New Norway and Bashaw, but our planning is based on increased offerings to cover Messiah's share of the cost. It will likely be several months until the call process is complete, but it will be important to watch to see if offerings increase as we move into fall.
