

Sharing Jesus Christ with All People

Pastor's Ponderings



"...I desire, as I have for many years, to come to you when I go to Spain. For I hope to see you on my journey and to be sent on by you, once I have enjoyed your company for a little while." (Romans 15:23b-24)

Our second readings through the summer are all from the book of Romans -

which will be my preaching texts through the season. Romans is Paul's masterwork - his theology is well-thought out, his pastoral skill is honed in navigating conflict, and he proclaims the certainty that nothing in all of creation can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus, our Lord.

But there are also some practical concerns as well - because Paul needs to raise money. Paul is diplomatic about his ask for support, which is why we don't usually think of Romans as a fundraising letter. He tells these house churches in Rome that he has a vision to proclaim the gospel all the way to Spain, and he hopes to visit them along the way - and he says "to be sent on by you."

Just stop at those words for a second or two and ponder them.

"To be sent on by you."

We can read this as a huge hint - Paul is saying in not so many words: "will you support my ministry financially?"

I'd like to think that Paul is not so direct because he's a little uncomfortable being a fundraiser. I can relate! But I also like how the practical concern of how to pay for ministry was just as important then as now.

Paul lays out the gospel of God's love in Jesus Christ for all, and his vision of where God is calling him next, but also a very real need for support.

The truth is the church needs people who have dreams and a creative imagination of where God

might be calling us. At Messiah I have heard your dreams of supporting more refugees. I have heard your wondering of how we can provide a shelter for the homeless. I have heard your hopes of growing the ways we share music with our community.

And as much as we need these visions - the church also needs those of you who put on the reading glasses and look carefully at each budget line item, and ask how we are going to pay for these dreams.

And it turns out that was true even for Paul as he writes to the Romans.

So I give thanks for the dreamers and visionaries among us.

And I give thanks for those of you who remind us of the practical realities of those dreams.

And I give thanks for all of you - for your generosity in supporting the work of Messiah - whether that's through your offering or your many gifts of time and talent.

I've seen people's lives changed by the welcome extended at Martha's Table, and to our visitors in the office who are given a drink of cold water on a hot day, and by the many ways in which you live out your call of service in our community. We make a difference!

I hope you enjoy the rest and relaxation of summertime. As you take your holidays, I hope you have time to reconnect with family and God's creation. I hope you continue dreaming about the ways that God is calling us as a church community.

Meanwhile there will still be bills and salaries to pay, and ministry doesn't stop over the summer, either.

I am so very grateful for your faithful giving to our shared mission.

Pastor's Message

WE ARE ALL EQUAL IN THE EYES OF GOD ... HOW ABOUT IN OUR EYES?



On June 21, we had a national day set aside to celebrate diversity. Many of us are not even aware of this day. Isn't it kind of sad that we have to actually purposely do that? It means that we still need reminders to treat one another as

equals. And so, it is good that we do set this time aside because we truly need to be reminded. The trouble is we forget so easily.

We are so unaware of how we think of those who are different. We are so steeped in our old thinking that creates an atmosphere of judgement rather than justice and love and mercy. We talk a big talk of "welcome" as Christians, but our hearts are still not always very welcoming.

Jesus is our greatest example of one who treated all as equals. He was a Jew. And even in his day... the gentiles were the outsiders. But Jesus never held anyone as being outside of his circle of those to love and care about. All were welcome in his presence and worth his time.

We live in a house of much diversity. Our daughter, as many of you know, comes from Haiti and was adopted from an orphanage. Her skin color is black. Our son is differently abled with down's syndrome and autism. And we too are different and unique in our own ways. In fact, are not all our families full of diversity? This world is full of diversity. And it makes it a colorful place to be.

This is something we have had to learn about and have had to experience first hand - how others sometimes treat people of difference. We have been so surprised by how still in this society there is still racial bullying and name calling and how people of difference are not seen as having gifts but rather as people to be looked down upon or even pitied.

Micah 6:8 is a passage I have quoted many times but it fits this so well. "What does the Lord require of you, but to love kindness and mercy, do justice and walk humbly with your God."

If we walk humbly with God we are reminded that we too are among those who are blessed to be loved by our Lord. This is a free gift to all and includes all. Our God sees each of us with the greatest value and loves us equally. Each of us is different and each of us is unique and each of us is differently abled. Are we not?

We are all equals in the eyes of God and so very precious; and, Jesus treated all he met on his path as and equal... with love and mercy and humble equality. How can we do any other?

We are all loved by God with unconditional love and accepted as we are.

And so today as I write, I invite each of us to remember this. We might even think we are not among those who look down on those with difference but if we are honest most of us struggle with this in some way without even knowing it. And we forget that we too are people of difference.

When our son was born with down's syndrome, I found myself dreaming at night that we were half a family because of him. I could hardly believe that this was in my heart. But there it was deep in the depths of my soul... my prejudice. I was so ashamed of this hidden sin that crept its way up to the surface. I soon found out that actually because of him we are twice the family because of the gift of his presence.

We often think that we are above prejudice but truly when we see those who are different than us... we struggle don't we?

Let us be open in our hearts to all. Let look upon every other person with the love of Jesus and with the value of OUR creator. For each of us are created in the beautiful image of God.

I am thankful for all the differences in this world and the diversity.

What a gift! It makes us all richly blessed!!!

As people of God, let us follow our Lord's example.





Dear Beloved of God –
In preparation for the Lutheran

In preparation for the Lutheran World Federation Assembly, September 2023, in Krakow, Poland, a pre-assembly for the Americas was held in April 2023, in Bogota, Colombia, under the LWF Assembly theme: "One Body, One Spirit, One Hope." (Ephesians 4:4)

I was invited to present on the third phrase of the Assembly theme, "One Hope." I began by recalling a gathering where Rev. Dr. Rafael Malpica Padilla shared a definition of faith and hope that has stayed with me: "Faith is the ability to listen to the melody of the future and hope is the courage to dance to its rhythm now."

With so many causes for despair we are still called to hope. On what do we base our hope? What is the melody of the future? How can we dance when the melody is faint, unfamiliar, or forgotten; and the melodies around us are not of promise or hope, but destruction, violence, and polarization?

We all know of the social, political, economic, and ecological marginalization happening globally, regionally, and locally. The COVID-19 pandemic further unmasked these injustices. Yet in the midst of these overwhelming realities, we are still called to witness, dance, and hope.

Paul's letter to the Ephesians insists on hope. Why?

- Hope is a gift of the Holy Spirit.
- Hope knows what God has done in Christ and sees it in everyday life.
- This hope is "eschatological" not yet fulfilled, but already active where faith moves us to renew the earth and to reform injustice. Luther's catechism teaches that this hope is expressed when we pray, "Your kingdom come. Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."
- Hope liberates from worldly powers and encourages us to forge ahead, united in purpose.
- Hope proclaims that in this broken world, God does not abandon us.

So how are we to dance to the melody of the future with courage? Rev. Dr. Gordon Jensen, retired professor from Lutheran Theological Seminary,

Saskatoon, Canada, recently wrote: "When we experience the gospel, we and the church cannot help but be engaged in the transformation of lives and the transformation of society." (Jensen, Canada Lutheran vol. 38, no. 1 Jan/Feb 2023, p. 8)

The Spirit compels us to participate in God's work of establishing justice and making peace – to transformation – so that all may have abundant life.

Gifted and nurtured by the Spirit, hope is a vital component of our common mission through our worship, proclamation, diakonia, humanitarian work and advocacy in the public space, and through our ecumenical and interfaith commitment.

The late Vitor Westhelle wrote: "The theology of the cross ... [moves] into hopeful solidarity, the solidarity of those who are moved by the pain of God in the midst of the world, or by the pain of the world in the midst of God." (From Padilla, "Martin Luther for the Life of the Church," in The Forgotten Luther III, Minneapolis: Fortress Press, 2021, p 92)

In this hopeful solidarity we know that our dance will be changed – will be enriched and strengthened – and other dance steps will be learned, shared, taught. In this hopeful solidarity we recognize moving to a vocation of living and working together in ongoing reformation.

This is not a static reality, nor an end in itself: we live and work together to respond to God's call and to join God in God's mission in the world, supporting each other to witness vibrantly in our diverse contexts through diaconal service, and through advocacy for justice, peace, and reconciliation everywhere and always.

Padilla concluded his presentation in 2022 with these words: "The tools for the work [are]: faith, hope, and love. Faith, the ability to hear the melody of the future; hope, the courage to dance to its rhythm here and now; and love, a stubborn and unwavering commitment."

May we together have such faith, hope, and love.

How do Canadian Families, serving beyond our borders, and overseas, in the Name of Jesus, provide for their children's education?

Here is one family's story:

23 June, 2023

Hi Mum Watts, and friends at Messiah,

Thanks for your continued support of the work going on here in Jesus' Name in Kenya. We have seen some great strides forward in

relationships with students in our dorm, in our classes, and in so many other settings. Just a few days ago I had a staff member stop me to say how much of an impact I was having in their daughter's life right now. All I do is teach them Phys Ed - but there is so much room for discipling and relationship all around us every day.

There are so many small reminders here of why we're at Rift Valley Academy in Kenya at this time. We are constantly reminded that not only does RVA give us the chance to pour into the lives of these young people, but so much critical mission work all over Africa simply would stop without RVA being an option for missionary kids.

RVA Year Wrapping Up

We are into our last few weeks of our first year at RVA and it's been full of teaching, dorm fun, sports, and lots more.

Alma (11) is still adjusting to life at RVA. She has made some good friends and enjoys the chance to do so many things she's never been able to do before like band, sports, etc.

Micah (16) is still deeply involved in a lot of music stuff (choir, jazz band, etc). It's been great to be here, get to know his friends, and be much more connected to him on a daily basis.

Matea (19) had a fantastic year at the Torchbearers Bible School just outside Grenoble, France and will start studying counselling/psychology at Trinity Western University in the fall. She has come here to Kenya and is currently volunteering at a local coffee shop, and helping out with stuff with our dorm girls.

Jonah (21) just finished the third year of his computer science degree at Trinity Western University in British Columbia. He also came home and is serving RVA as an intern. He's helped out in the IT department, and had done a ton of work completely redoing the audio/video and lights in the chapel building.

Continued Healing

One of the reasons why we have everyone of the family here is so we can all go together for counselling in July. We feel incredibly blessed to have the opportunity to get some time in at a center in Turkey that specifically serves missionary families. While our family has received a lot of help since our attack in 2020, we all are healing and recovering at our own pace. Susan and I have received the counselling, time, and other resources to process the trauma from the attack, but the kids have not had the same opportunity. We are praying that these two weeks of intensive counselling will give them a significant step forward in their healing.

Support

While this counselling center is set up to cater to missionaries and is very affordable for this level of care, the entire trip is going to cost more than what our support account can currently bear. If you can give towards the cost of this it would be greatly appreciated.

In Canada, support goes through the "Great Commission Foundation", Abbotsford, BC.
