Pastor's Ponderings



It's back to Fall again — with its returning rhythm of back to school, back to meetings and back to all those things in our schedules that took a summer hiatus. For me these days are filled with some anticipation and excitement, and a little bit of grief that summer never seems to last long enough!

Starting Sunday September 10th and through Pentecost 2024 we are experimenting with a different set of bible readings in Messiah's worship. We are calling it "Joining God's Story" but it's technically called the "Narrative Lectionary" (our name is way more exciting, eh?).

Narrative is a fancy word for "story" and the Bible, at its heart, is the wonderful story of God's activity that begins with creation, travels through the promise made to Israel, winds its way to the coming of Jesus, journeys through the stories of the early church and ends with the New Creation in Revelation that we are still anticipating. It's this grand story that we are caught up in as God's people.

We have had a long tradition of four scripture readings each Sunday: one from the Old Testament, one from the psalms, one from the New Testament letters and one from the Gospels. This means that we hear a wide variety of voices from the bible, but we don't always get the sense of the how each of the readings connects to the others, or the story that connects them all.

The biggest change you might notice is that there will now be only one reading each Sunday — and that reading will follow the story arc of scripture. Through the Fall we will read mainly from the Old Testament — hearing stories beginning with Adam and Eve, then Abraham and Sarah and family, Moses and the Exodus, David and the other kings. As we get closer to Advent we will hear from the prophets who longed for God's salvation in the midst of hard times.

You might miss the familiar gospel stories, but don't worry, beginning at Christmas and Epiphany and continuing through Lent and Easter, we will pick up the story of Jesus through the gospel of Mark. In the Easter Season, until Pentecost, we will hear the story of the early church through the books of Acts and Paul's letters.

We are not just trying this for the sake of change, but instead I have a couple of hopes:

I hope that you will get a better sense of how the bible fits together, and how God continues to speak through to us through the sweep of scripture. We often ignore the Old Testament, even if it's unintentional, because we are not quite sure what to make of the more difficult parts.

I also wonder how you might hear the stories of the bible differently in worship when we are only focusing on one reading each Sunday. So, I hope that over the next months you will enjoy the stops we'll make at the Garden of Eden, and Jacob wrestling with the angel, and Moses at the burning bush, and some more unfamiliar stories like David singing when he becomes king, and even King Josiah's Reformation (that one you may never have heard before!)

In this experiment, we might find that we don't like it as much — or we might find that we are hearing God speak to us in a new way, making these stories of faith a little more accessible for us today.

Watch the bulletin board in the Fellowship Centre as we follow the story through the year.

And know that I always love to hear from you, so let me know what you think over these next few weeks as we are Joining God's Story.

I'm looking forward to the opportunity to preach parts of the Bible that I haven't preached on before — and seeing how God can give us fresh ears and hearts to hear the stories of scripture anew.

God's story is quite an adventure — let's jump in together!

As people of God perhaps we could also ponder how we might serve our Lord in different and new ways by joining something that reaches God's people.

Someone asked me the other day what I might sign up for that might be fun and different. So, I have been pondering what I might decide to join to do something new this fall. Sometimes I find it very easy to get into a bit of a rut and just do what I've always done. Sometimes our Lord calls us into something new and that is exciting and even a bit scary too. Whenever we move into new beginnings, whether we are used to them or not, we are called as people of God to trust in our God in all things.

Proverbs 3:5-6 says this," Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him and he will direct your paths."

Our God is directing us as God's church. Our lord is guiding our steps and opening ways to moving forward.

This is a great verse to take with us as we enter the new beginnings of this season. It reminds us to look to God for our direction as we move forward into what is before us. Dear Beloved of God -

On a regular basis I have folks ask me, what are you reading? Many know that I read ferociously, with several books always on the go, ranging from popular novels to church leadership, poetry to mystery novels, light reading to heavy-duty reading. Over the next

few months and columns, I will be sharing some excellent reads.

Recently I have appreciated a newly published book which is very accessible. A great resource for small group study and conversation, and/or for congregational councils: Leading Faithful Innovation: Following God into a Hopeful Future Dwight Zscheile, community life and witness to changing cultural Michael Binder and Tess Pinkstaff, ©2023 Fortress Press, Minneapolis.

What might God be up to amid the seismic changes the church and our culture are undergoing? What opportunities will congregations encounter if they rediscover and follow God's leading? Leading Faithful <u>Innovation</u> offers a practical, hands-on approach to addressing this challenge, a process that culminates in the hope that comes from following the Spirit.

Leading Faithful Innovation explores Acts 16:6-15, the story about the biblical Lydia, to embody the key themes of this book. Jesus' followers are led by the Holy Spirit on a path where the destination isn't clear when they start. The road isn't straightforward. They discover where to go by listening, acting, and reflecting. They must practice being hosted by others in neighborhood spaces they don't control. They are redirected multiple times as dead ends lead to open doors but not necessarily the open doors they expected. Throughout, they must depend on God's leading, not their own strategies and plans.

This is the kind of journey that characterizes much of what we read in the New Testament about the early church. The Jesus movement was about a group of strangers and friends being joined together by God into a community practicing a distinct way of life that crossed cultural and geographical boundaries. That movement was animated by the life-giving Holy Spirit, which broke down walls, bound people together, and freed them to take risks in love. It was a subversive movement that called into question the predominant narratives and structures of the day.

Many church leaders today find themselves on an unexpected journey. We are learning/relearning how to be led by God's Spirit like the early followers, exercising both patience and the willingness to move quickly and responsively. This journey means learning to pay attention to the Holy Spirit in new ways.

Dwight Zscheile, Michael Binder, and Tessa Pinkstaff (each from Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minnesota) build on Scripture, theology, and the latest leadership and change theories to guide church leaders on a journey toward grassroots, participatory spiritual growth.

Innovation, for the authors, is defined as the adoption of a new practice in a community. Innovation is not invention, rather it is the adaptation of Christian circumstances. Something which the church has always done. Above all, innovation recognizes the agency and activity of God. God continues to create, re -create, restore, reconcile, and heal the world. Faithful innovation is about joining the Spirit's movement.

This faithful innovation begins with a three-step process: listen, act, and share. Listen – listen to God, one another, and our neighbours. Act – try something new based on God's leading. Share – reflect on your actions and share your story. Real-life stories and supportive spiritual practices make each step toward effective change accessible and actionable.

The book then examines how these steps change the culture of a church, establishing a new, biblically grounded way of being church. The authors present leadership practices that invite readers to redefine their leadership identity, accept the loss of their role as the primary driver of their congregation, and discover new hope and possibility. These topics are again fleshed out with real-life stories and undergirded by suggested practices.

The authors believe that the church's future is waiting to be discovered not inside the walls of church buildings or in committee meetings but on journeys into the neighbourhood, "outside the gate" at the "place of prayer" (Acts 16:13 where the spiritually curious gather in dynamic relationship with both the

Spirit of God and the Lydias of our own day.

It's worth a read.

There has been so much heartache around the world causing staggering needs due to the affects of war, earthquakes, floods and drought. CLWR endeavors to be where the needs are greatest, but our help is needed. We will look at a few specific areas.

SOUTH SUDAN

Devastating floods have displaced more than 400,000 people. Farming has been severely affected. In some places the people are trying to fish where they used to farm. \$45 will give food assistance to a family for a month. \$10 will provide a fishing kit to help a family whose land is flooded.

SYRIA & TURKIYE

Millions were affected by the massive earthquakes in February. The immediate needs were emergency supplies, but ongoing help is needed for those who did not have a home to return to. CLWR is working to rehabilitate homes and other vital infrastructure, and providing psychosocial support such as trauma care and employment support.

BURUNDI

Conflict and changing climate have left thousands of families facing hunger. Local partners are providing families with immediate food assistance and also livelihood training, equipment, supplies, livestock, and seeds to grow their own food, improving the family's nutrition and developing new income sources.

EAST AFRICA

Help is needed for families facing hunger, conflict and the effects of climate change. Millions are in need of basic necessities to survive.

Treasurer's Report August 2023

At the annual meeting there was agreement to adopt a budget for the year with a deficit of \$40,706. It was recognized that this will be a transitional year, with the deficit to be funded by using the operating surplus from last year. The intention is that we get back to a balanced budget next year.

The good news is that for the three months to the end of July we are showing a deficit of only \$3,204. This is an improvement since the end of June when it was \$8,703. There is a significant variation in offerings and expenses by month, but it is encouraging to see that offerings from envelopes, plate offerings, and other donation income for May to July is up by \$15,000 compared to last year.

Financially July was a very good month. It may be related to the fact there were five Sundays in July, we received one special donation, and some August envelopes were received in July probably because the last Sunday was so close to the end of the month. It will be interesting to see whether the increased giving continues in August.

More good news is that in June we received the final disbursement of \$19,427 from the estate of Norma Branes. Most of her generous bequest has been reserved for the major roof repairs that will be required before long. Many thanks to Norma for her thoughtfulness in including Messiah in her will.

It was also encouraging in July to receive a special donation of \$15,000 designated for the Roof Fund. More will be required, but we have a very good start on the costs of the roofing project when the time comes.

We thank God for the generous support that enables our congregation to continue His ministry.



GOD WRITES A BETTER STORY ... Thank you Messiah friends



The beginning of my interest in Missions and in the Tanzania mission field began at a Luther League camp in 1955 when a missionary from Tanzania came as the Bible Teacher for our youth week. He and his family were stationed at the Mwika Bible School near the base of Mt. Kilimanjaro in Tanzania, East Africa. Little did I know that 50 years later in retirement, I would find myself invited as a guest Bible Teacher, teaching students at that same school how to use the Bible Society Swahili Bible Story Book in their work as evangelists and teachers. Along with his terrific Bible Teaching, our youth camp leader taught us a Swahili song. A simple chorus which God permanently inscribed on my heart. For 50+ years I had no need to speak, think or sing anything Swahili. However, during my first week in Tanzania in 2006

I was sitting with an older evangelist waiting for a meeting to begin and I found myself flipping through the Swahili hymn book. My eye caught the words: Mungu ni Pendo (Our God is Love). There it was, our old Bible Camp song! I quickly closed the book and began to sing from the songbook of my own heart those old precious words ... in Swahili! The evangelist looked shocked as he said to me, "You speak Swahili!" I told him my story and realized I had a sermon I could share everywhere I went in the next 8 weeks! When God writes his story on the heart He uses indelible ink!

I spent the following 14 years travelling to Tanzania each year to two particular areas teaching the Bible to church leaders, Sunday School teachers, youth workers, women's groups, neighborhood Bible Study groups, Pastors and Evangelists, Bible School students and ...! I made it my mission to distribute the Bible Society Swahili Bible Story Book to each group and each home I could. In my last year I surpassed the distribution of 5000 books. By then I missed a year because of knee surgery. Then came Covid when practically the whole world stood still, and then two years ago I had a serious fall and the shattering of my right

femur and right shoulder. And things did not go back together neatly! I kept hoping and praying I'd be ready to continue my annual treks... but not to be. I had to let go of Tanzania! Not an easy letting go! Surely there must be a way to keep going! Oh how I struggled with "No."

Now here is the major reason for this newsletter article. This project is not only a story written by me. From my childhood, I grew up learning God's wonderful stories in the Bible. When I

discovered the Swahili Bible Story book was available in Tanzania I quickly made the decision to provide this terrific book to as many homes, church groups, church leaders and Sunday School teachers as possible. I had a wonderfully positive response from friends like many of you folks who wanted to be part of sowing "Bible Storybook seeds." Thus, each year with gifts from friends, I was able to purchase and give away about 500 books. Parents, grandparents and children begged to have this book in their homes.

Here at Messiah, your MLW group invited me to tell the story of the Tanzania Project ... my small project of providing Swahili Bible Story Books in the two large districts where I was fortunate to work with enthusiastic Pastors. The story book — Sehema za Biblia kwa Watoto — was available in the Bible Society of Tanzania and I could easily get books delivered where I needed them. This Bible Story Book project was supported generously and faithfully by a great number of you. Your support was amazing and enabled me to provide just over 5000 Books in the years I travelled to Tanzania. Messiah Lutheran Women also recently sent 3 boxes of baby quilts, dresses for young girls, and many other valuable items.

From the beginning I sensed that together we were writing a wonderful story. But as the demand for books was increasing and the opportunities for distribution were growing steadily, I realized God was writing a much better story! He always does if we let Himl Covid and my own sudden physical limitations prevented me from returning to continue the Tanzania Project. Early this year Canada Revenue told us there were new limitations for projects such as mine, so I was forced to clear out the account. I managed to put together a huge order of Bible books and get them delivered to several locations where Pastors, Evangelists and committed friends are distributing them now! The account had \$19,343.00! Imagine! Enough for over 500 Bible Story Books and hundreds of children's materials and children's booklets.







Sigrid Edith Christiansen Ostrem passed away on January 22, 2023, in St. Paul, MN at the age of 88. Sigrid was born November 19, 1934 in Oberlin Ohio to Olaf and Ellen (Kios) Christiansen. When she was six her family moved to Northfield, Minnesota when her father joined her grandfather on the music faculty at St. Olaf College. She stayed in Northfield through high school and college, graduating from St. Olaf in 1958. After a year teaching in St. James, Minnesota, she and a college friend moved to Long Beach, California. There she met Bob Ostrem, a St. Olaf classmate she knew by reputation only, but they soon began a quick courtship and engagement. As Sigrid recounted, Bob told a friend that night that he was going to marry Sigrid, and proposed for the first time just a few weeks later - it took a couple of asks before she said yes! In 1958 they married and were blessed with three children: Sten (Jill) of St. Paul, Sue, currently working in Kyiv, Ukraine, and Kristi Lacey of Camrose, Alberta. After living in Long Beach, Minneapolis, Iowa, and New York, they headed north to Camrose, Alberta, Canada, where they spent 32 years. During that time, Sigrid not only kept the family organized, she also taught music, volunteered on dozens of committees and boards (at one point a member of more than 40 groups), taught courses at Camrose Lutheran Bible Institute (CLBI), directed and sang in choirs and served on the board of Messiah Lutheran Church. In 1996 they retired, and she and Bob spent winters in Mesa, Arizona, where many fellow retirees, including many of Bob's family from Alberta, fled to escape the cold. She spent almost every summer of her life in Sister Bay, Wisconsin, where her extended family traditionally spent their summers. Sigrid and Bob made the most of retirement - taking classes, volunteering, perfecting their tennis games, and traveling. Perhaps more than anything, Sigrid was known for her hospitality - she and Bob opened their doors and welcomed friends and family into their home regularly. There was always good food, good conversation and a lot of laughter. After Bob died in 2004, she continued her routine of winters in Arizona and summers in Wisconsin, active in her churches in both locations. Several years ago she adopted her dog Casey, soon coming to love Casey as much, if not more, than her children! Casey brought joy and companionship to her every day – they were inseparable. As short-term memory problems developed, Sigrid made the move to a senior apartment in Sister Bay and finally to Episcopal Homes in St. Paul, MN, where she died peacefully in her sleep. Sigrid leaves behind a great many people whom she loved and who loved her, and are missing her presence: Sten, Jill, Sue, Kristi; grandchildren Cooper, Lauren and Meg; sister Julie Christiansen (Carl Dietz), sister-in-law Mary Christiansen, sister in-law Marion Ostrem, nieces, nephews, cousins and many friends. in Ellison Bay, Wisconsin on Friday, July 21, 2023 at 1:00 pm, with a reception following at her cottage on Little Sister Bay.
